DEMOCRATIC STATE CONVENTION

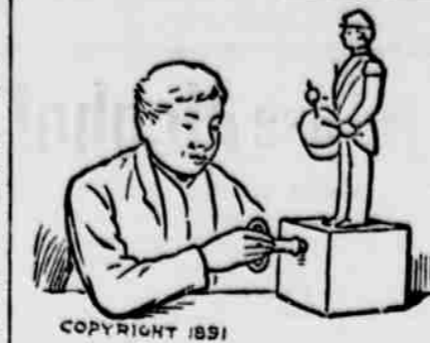
The Philadelphia Times of Sunday prognosticates the action of the State Convention as follows: The Democratic State Convention in Harrisburg, April 13, will be composed of 463 delegates, the 85 from this city and 33 from Allegheny making up about one fourth of the number.

The convention will nominate a candidate for Justice of the Supreme Court and two candidates for Congressmen-at-Large. The selection of thirty-two Presidential electors and sixty-four delegates to the National Convention at Chicago will be practically left to the Congressional districts and have been generally agreed upon.

For Supreme Judge there is no opposition to the nomination of Justice Christopher Heydrick, of Venango, successor by appointment of Governor Pattison to the late Justice Clarke. For Congressman at Large the leading candidates are Mayor Thomas P. Merritt, of Berks, a World's Fair Commissioner; Lawyer D. C. DeWitt, of Bradford; Ex-Federal District Attorney George A. Allen, of Erie; Robert E. James, a leading member of the Northampton bar; John Kuhns, of Westmoreland, president of the Greensburg Steel Company; Ex-Congressman John B. Storm, of Monroe, and Captain William Hasson, of Venango.

In the line of delegates-at-large to the Chicago Convention there are a number of candidates. State Senator George Ross, of Bucks, and William M. Singler, of this city, will likely receive the united support of Eastern Pennsylvania counties, including the Philadelphia delegation of eighty five.
