That there is a large and intelligent element in the Republican party of Pennsylvania that earnestly opposes Quay's re-election to the Senate, is not doubted by any dispassionate ob server of political movements; but it is without organization ; it is untrained in the machine methods which win political victories these days, and they are powerless in a contest at the primaries against a superbly organized and disciplined army that quickly responds to the call of party masters. This el-ement holds in its hands the control of the Legislature, as it could readily turn he election of legislators in onefillment of a very com- big times. It is said he burned out a third or more of the districts in the State'; but the white heat of a Presidential contest will strengthen the feeble and resolve the doubting in favor of party obligations.

The issue on the Senatorship in Pennsylvauia is now clearly narrowed down to the support of Quay or revolution, and all parties in interest may as well look the facts squarely in the face. In 1885 Quay appealed to the Republican people for vindication as a candidate for State Treasurer, and he was sustained by a majority of 40,000. Now, for the first time in the history of modern politics, he has appealed directly to the Republican people at the primaries for vindication as a Senator, and thus far he has had an unbroken succession of triumphs. If the people shall elect the Senators and Representatives thus instructed for Quay, he will be given the highest right to claim his re-election as demanded by clearly expressed party sentiment, and none within the party household could justly criticise the Legislature for renewing his Senatorial ing for him conveyed the remains Commission. 




