Can you Cook a Trout.

To fry a trout well is a great art, and rarely understood. The fat, be it butter olive oil or lard, should be sweet and burning hot. As soon as browned, the fish should be lifted out and the fat allowed to drain off. A thin slice of salt pork or bacon will go well with the fish, but too much bacon may give them a smoky flavor. Small trout from six to eight inches long are cooked in this mauner. Any sized fish may be roasted in the ashes, and they are excellent in that way, but trout from a fourth to three-fourths of a pound give the best results. But, above all, give as a good big trout, boiled properly, with a little white-wine vinegar in the water, and served hot with either caper or egg sauce and a glass or two of white caper wine to wash them down, says Forest and Stream.
