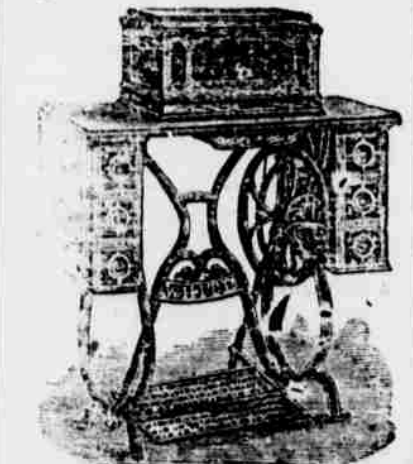

Miss Balfour, whom Lyttleton Gladstone (son of the G. O. M.) is to marry, is not Arthur James Balfour's sister, as has been currently published, but another lady of the same name.

Time works no changes with Patti, they say. With the managers it is different, for at Covent Garden thirty years ago she was paid \$500 a month; now it is \$4,000 a night and a share of the receipts beside.

Queen Natalie of Servia is trying to find a publisher for her memoirs, which will contain the story of her divorce. The authorities of Berlin and Vienna refused to allow her to print the book in those capitals.

Tennessee has six surviving ex-governors, all of whom still reside in that State. The oldest and most noted of these is Senator Isham G. Harris, who has been in office nearly sixty years, thirty of which have been passed in the Senate.

Ex-Queen Isabella of Spain receives \$150,000 per annum, which is very fat from covering her expenses, and she is invariably head over ears in debt, so much so, indeed, that she has frequently been placed in the most embarrassing situations.

Louis Kossuth recently wrote to some compatriots, who were indulging in a commemorative banquet, and stated in the missive that he is practically as strong and vigorous as ever, except for an occasional failure of his eyesight. He is ninety years old.

M. Ribet, the French statesman, ascribes a large share of his success to the sagacious encouragement he has received from his wife, who was formerly Miss Burch, daughter of a Chicago banker. The Chicago girl has long been proverbial for her understanding.

The fortune of the Duchess of Montpensier, estimated to exceed \$30,000,000, will upon her death go to her daughter, Countess of Paris. Her only son, Don Antonio, whom she cordially dislikes, will get as little of her wealth as will her eldest sister, ex-Queen Isabella.

Mrs. Coleman Drayton, when she was Miss Gussie Astor, was so noted among her friends for the marked simplicity of her manners and the engaging candor of her life that a portrait of her, pressing a milk-white dove to her bosom, was circulated among her friends with the title "Innocence" beneath it.

Judge Emery, of the Supreme Judicial Court of Maine, was given a pair of white kid gloves not long ago by the grand jury of Franklin county as an emblem of the county's irrefragable morals. The judge had to dismiss the jury from service because there were no indictments to be acted upon at the term for which the jurors were drawn.

Empress Eugenie felt so acutely the complete absence of recognition which she experienced when walking about Paris last year that she has declined to stay there on her way to Cape Martin, though much pressed to do so. Princess Mathilde met her at Gare du Nord, and while waiting for a train they dined like ordinary passengers in the refreshment-room, quite unnoticed by the rest of the inmates. The empress is looking stronger than she has for some years.

The oldest inhabitant of Southern Indiana is Alexander Hockaday of Blue River township. He was born in what is now the State of Kentucky, in 1780, and consequently is in his 112th year. He is the father of twelve children, and his wife, who is thirty years his junior, is still living. Mr. Hockaday never took but one dose of medicine in his life, and did not take that until he was more than one hundred years old. He is hale and hearty and bids fair to live several years yet.
