

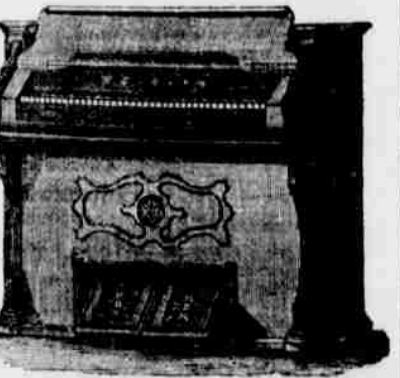

BUSINESS AND INDUSTRIAL.

A Japan radish is ten feet in length. Servants are getting scarce in England.

Mahogany is the right thing for furniture again.

Liverpool is the largest shipping port in the world.

The West Grove, Penn., bank has 10,000 dimes on deposit.

There are over 200,000 miles of railroad in the United States.

A new horseshoe is made of canvas and is cemented to the hoof.

Louisiana has 6,477 bearing orange trees and 54,000 pecan trees.

Before it is ready for the hand a glove goes through 219 manipulations.

The total production of pig-iron in this country last year was 9,373,455 tons.

In Colorado the Southern Pacific Railroad is ballasted for some distance with rock salt.

The cost per family of food in the United States is \$243.65 a year, against \$222.52 in Europe.

The census shows that the value of tropical and semi-tropical fruits grown in this country is nearly \$20,000,000.

One hundred and twenty-three thousand two hundred and twenty-seven coconut trees have been set out recently in Florida.

There are over four hundred fertilizer factories in the United States which produce more than \$20,000,000 worth of fertilizers annually.

The hand-book by the Federation of Labor shows the strength of the seventy-four national trade unions of the United States to be 675,117.

Wages are so low in India that men may be hired for \$2 a month to do household work. A dollar is a great sum to them and one meal a day the rule.

The shipment of Alabama coal from the Gulf ports of Mexico, Texas and other points is rapidly becoming one of the most important of Southern industries.

Raising sheep for wool alone in Ohio is no longer profitable. Merino sheep are fast being bred with Shropshires, and the wools of the State now begin to show the change.

From Electricity we learn that two 15-horsepower motors are now generally used for each electric street car. The price of equipment for a car is from \$1,500 to \$2,000.

It is estimated that the best three sugar factories of California, the two in Nebraska and the one at Salt Lake City, will each produce 3,000,000 pounds of sugar during the present season.

At the present time there are forty-nine Minnesota iron companies fully incorporated and on the market, their combined capital stock amounting to \$112,000,000. The companies are stocked from \$1,000,000 to \$6,000,000 each.

The United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland has neither petroleum nor natural gas. Our product of each in 1888 was nearly \$25,000,000 on the spot—the aggregate, as given by the latest report of the United States Geological Survey, being over \$47,000,000.

The amount of capital invested in the lumber business in the United States is placed at \$75,000,000. There are 3,000,000 people, or nearly one-twentieth of our population, engaged directly in the handling and manufacturing of lumber which is the largest industry in this country.

The wonderful growth in the beet-sugar industry is shown by the following statistics: In 1887 there was only one such refinery in this country. This produced 400,000 pounds of sugar. In 1888 the total output was 3,600,000 pounds, while in 1891 California produced 13,000,000 pounds and Nebraska and Utah 6,000,000 pounds each.

At this season of the year, when one begins to pack away winter furs and flannels, the mind grows excited over the prospect of moths. HAPPENINGS ABROAD.

Belgium is the first country to make hypnotizing an offense against the law of the land.

Argentine revenue receipts for the present quarter exceed those of last year by \$10,000,000.

The population of Greece is increasing faster than that of any other country in Europe at present.

London barmaids are mostly industrious and respectable girls whose lot is eliciting much sympathy.

The English admiralty has given an order for two gunboats to be built for special service on Lake Nyanza, to assist in suppressing the slave traffic.

The receipts of the railroads owned by the Belgian government increased from \$9,000,000 annually to \$24,000,000 within the last thirteen years.—Progressive Age.

The sum John Bull has appropriated for the British exhibition at the World's Fair is \$125,000. It is considered so ridiculously small that an increase is probable.

The Russian naval estimates for 1892 amount to 17,882,233 rubles, or 2,991,961 rubles more than last year, which sum is to be spent upon the building of new ships.

Circassian boys and girls may still be bought in Constantinople at fair prices. This is due more to the fact that their parents are eager to sell them than to any real existence of slavery.

In the vicinity of the Dutch town of Heerlen, systematic borings recently resulted in the discovery of coal at a depth of 30 to 100 yards only. The coal-beds are now found to have a thickness of from three to five feet.

The Rajah of Hunza, who claims to be a direct descendant of Alexander the Great, inquires of his chief minister every morning, "Who is the greatest monarch in the world?" invariably receiving for answer, "Your Excellency."

Not long ago a consignment of 500 Brazilian parrots were received in Paris. Soon after their arrival an epidemic broke out among them and all but two died. Thirteen persons who bought parrots from the lot have been attacked by infectious pneumonia and five have died.
