A CURIOUS PARADOX.

Why a Pound of Feathers is Heavier Than a Pound of Lead.

Which is the heavier, a pound of feathers or a pound of lead? This was a favorite question with "school committee men" of the olden time, and the first rash answer used almost always to be, "a pound of lead!" Then from the older pupils would come the reply—"Both alike." If this question were asked to-day, our old-time querist might receive a decided surprise. For the pound of feathers could easily be proved to be the heavier. A simple experiment is all the evidence needed.

With any accurate scales weigh out a pound of lead, using ordinary shot for convenience. Pour the shot into one of the pans of a balance.

For the feathers a light muslin bag will be needed, and care must be taken that feathers and bag do not weigh more than a pound. When the bag of feathers is put into the other pan of the balance the beam will, after a few oscillations, come to rest exactly level.

So far the verdict, "Both alike," seems to be proved. But place the balance upon the receiver of an air pump, with lead and feathers undisturbed. Cover the whole with the glass ball jar and exhaust the air. Slowly the feathers sink, and the lead "kicks the beam." The pound of feathers is heavier than the pound of lead!

The truth is that what we called a "pound" was not such in fact. For the atmosphere buoy up everything within it in proportion to the bulk of the object, and the feathers, being of greater bulk than the lead, are supported by the air to a considerably greater extent than the lead. Removed from this supporting medium, their true weight is made evident.

Charles Reade propounds a similar question. In one of his novels a Jewish trader is made to ask: "Which is the heavier a pound of feathers or a pound of gold?" After awhile he explains, to the satisfaction of his audience of miners, that the feathers are the heavier.

Gold, he says, is weighed by Troy weight, while feathers are weighed by avoirdupois; and as the twelve ounces in a pound Troy contain but 5,760 grains, while the avoirdupois pound contains 7,000 grains, the pound of feathers is, of course, 1,240 grains heavier than the pound of gold.—Youth's Companion.

An Ant Funeral.

Some of our readers may think that the following description has a romantic sound, but it is extracted from the Proceedings of the Linnean Society, having been communicated to that learned body by an observer in Australia. The writer saw a large number of ants surrounding those that he had killed, and determined to watch their proceedings closely. Accordingly he followed four or five that started off from the rest toward a hillock a short distance off, in which was an ant's nest. This they entered, and in about five minutes they reappeared, followed by others. All fell into rank, walking regularly and slowly, two by two until they arrived at the spot where lay the dead bodies of the soldier ants. In a few minutes two of the ants advanced and took up the body of one of their comrades; then two others, and so on, until all were ready to march. First walked two ants bearing a body, then two without a burden; then two others another dead ant, and so on, until the line was extended to about forty pairs, and the procession now moved slowly onward, followed by an irregular body of about 200 ants. Occasionally the two laden ants stopped, and laying down the dead body, it was taken up by the two walking unburdened behind them, and thus, by occasionally relieving each other, they arrived at a sandy spot near the sea. The body of ants now commenced digging with their jaws a number of holes in the ground, in each of which a dead ant was laid. Then they fell to and filled up the graves. This did not quite finish the remarkable circumstances attending this insect funeral. Some six or seven of the ants had attempted to run off without performing their share of the task of digging; these were caught and brought back, when they were at once attacked and killed upon the spot. A single grave was quickly dug, and they were all dropped into it.—Youth's Companion.
