Wolverton Nominated by Acclamation.

The democratic Conferees of the Seventeenth Congressional district met at Sunbury Saturday morning August 27th in the parlors of the city hotel to place in nomination a candidate for Congress. The Conferees were as follows: Columbia, J. K. Bittenbender, Bloomsburg; B. J. Doyle, Centralia; Montour, Thomas Chalfant, William Kase West, both of Danville; Northumberland, G. W. Armstrong, Sunbury; H. M. Snyder, Shamokin; Sullivan, Dr. Francis Chaffee, Forksville; C. E. Jackson, Bernice.

Thos. Chalfant of Montour was made Chairman, with J. K. Bittenbender and Dr. Chaffee as secretaries.

On motion of G. W. Armstrong of Northumberland and Wm. Kase West of Montour, Hon. S. P. Wolverton was named as the unanimous choice of the Conferees, and his nomination made by acclamation. A Committee consisting of Mr. West and Dr. Chaffee waited upon Mr. Wolverton and announced the action of the Conferees. Mr. Wolverton appeared and in a pleasant speech assured the Conferees of his appreciation of their action and of the instructions the Conferees received from each county embraced in the district. He hoped that all the democratic nominees in the district would be elected and offered himself for any work that he might be called upon to do. Addresses were made by Mr. West and Thos. Chalfant of Montour and Dr. Chaffee of Sullivan.

The Conferees stated that they believed perfect harmony to prevail in the several counties in the district and that Cleveland and Stevenson would receive increased democratic majority.

Williamsport and North Branch R. R.

The following from the Williamsport Republican, will be interesting reading to many in this section: "General Manager Benjamin G. Welch, of the Williamsport and North Branch railroad, was in town to-day, and stated to a Republican reporter that the contract for the extension of the Williamsport and North Branch railroad was let this morning, and the contractor is E. J. Gaynor, an extensive railroad contractor of Pottsville, who will begin work at once. The extension which has been spoken of before in the Republican is from Nordmont, the present terminus of the Williamsport and North Branch railroad, to Bernice or Dohm Summit, as is also called, where it will connect with the Lehigh Valley. The extension is eighteen miles in length, and the contractor agrees to finish the work in eight months.

"Contractor Gaynor has about finished a contract with the Norfolk and Western railroad, and he will move his whole plant up to the Williamsport and North Branch railroad; steam shovels, drills, etc., will all be brought here, and a large force of men put to work. The road is to be strictly first-class in every respect. There will be steel bridges, arch culverts, stone ballasting, and steel rails that are seventy pounds to the yard.

"In connection with the Harvey's Lake Branch of the Lehigh Valley this will make a through line to Wilkesbarre, and also to Towanda. It will also be the shortest route from Williamsport to Towanda, Waverly, Sayre, Binghamton, Albany and other places in Pennsylvania and York State.

"The probabilities are that the Lehigh Valley trains will enter Williamsport over the Reading road from Hall's. This is railroad news that ought to please every resident of this city, and there isn't much doubt but what it will. Williamsport will be a railroad centre yet.
