SULLIVAN DISCONSOLATE.

THE BIG FELLOW BEMOANS HIS FATE AND TAKES TO DRINK.

It transpires that Sullivan after his defeat began undoing all careful work of training which he and his trainers have been doing for weeks past. Defeat and chagrin coupled with the absence then of motive for further training doubtless led the man to resume his convivial habits. Others about him were drinking. When he awakened that morning he was taken over to the Gymnastic Club and there he was kept until the time when he should go with his people to the train on which the homeward journey was to begin at 8:30.

Sullivan at 4 P. M. was attired in bathing trunks and about to essay a plunge in the pool. The great giant presented a pitiable spectacle. The cut on his nose had been closed, but the eyes were blackened, the whole face swollen terribly. On the lower lip on the left side was a deep cut still open, and with whitening edges. The surfaces of the distended lips at the center had been literally smashed against his teeth by Corbett's blows. To spread forth all Sullivan said would edify no one and only render more pitiable the plight of the man, who through twelve years has been worshiped by the fistie world. He said that which in sober quiet he would not reiterate and which in his present condition may not be put on record as his deliberate views.

Sullivan lays greatest stress on the fact that he could not reach Corbett; the shifty lightning tactics of the new champion worried and dazed Sullivan. The Californian circled and circled, and kept Sullivan circling in order to face him. The frequent whirling, the whirl of the lights and the mazy swimming of thousands of white and eager faces banked up on all sides—all these tended to confuse and daze the big man of Boston. He never had been so puzzled before. The sensation was new. The lightning-like science of the younger man was a revelation to Sullivan, who in his best days had never possessed such pugilistic elements. Than add ten years difference in age and the conditions that confronted him have been fairly stated.

"But I did not run away," the big fellow almost sobbed. "Lock us up in a room—just lock me in a room with him and see what I could do with him."

Then he relighted the sodden cigar which he held between his raw and swollen lips. "But he licked me—yes, he did; he licked me, and let it go at that," he blurted. "I give him all the credit he wants. He licked me square enough, but I'm old, I am. Let him go through what I have. Let him knock 'em all out for twelve years, and then see if he can do any better than I did. But my father and mother put some sense in this (clumsily spearing at his temple with a big index finger) and I know when I'm licked, I do. Yes, he licked the champion, and now he's champion. Hand-some Dan Murphy was about the only one of the Sullivan outfit who was attending the ex-champion. Curious scrubbers in the bath department at the club house stared at the unsteady fighter as he strolled about the baths in his bathing trunks. He was practically in keeping until the hour when he should be gotten out of town. Wakeley and Johnson and Moran, his backers, where blocks away and about the hotels, while faithful Phil Casey was packing up for the journey. Jack Ashton was drinking in a party whose chief occupation was admiration of Jack McAuliffe, who was about the bar-room. Thus go the shifting fortunes of pugilistic war.
