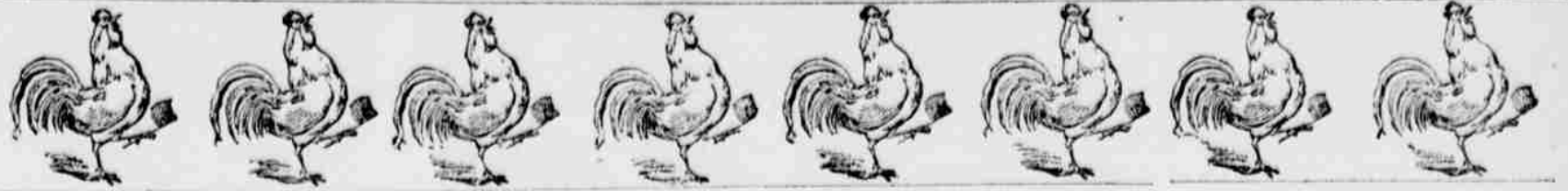

Presbyterian Women's Missionary Society.

The meeting of the Women's Missionary Society of the Presbyterian Church last week Wednesday and Thursday was a very interesting one. A large number of delegates were in attendance. The opening services were held on Wednesday evening.

This society met again on Thursday morning in the Presbyterian church and spent a half hour in devotional services under the direction of Mrs. Wm. Neal. The corresponding secretary gave a report of the work accomplished during the year, and was followed by a report of the treasurer, Mrs. Stuart Mitchell. This showed the money contributed by the different auxiliaries in the congregation amounted to \$2255.61. It is with pleasure we note that of this \$361.01 came from societies connected with the church in Bloomsburg. In addition to this a box of articles valued at \$70 was sent to a mission school supported by this society in New Mexico. On account of the unavoidable absence of Mrs. Mitchell, the treasurer's report was read by her daughter, Miss Rene. Mrs. Lundy, of Williamsport, a delegate to the Synodical society, which met in Harrisburg, gave an account of the proceedings of that body, which was listened to with much interest.

Attention was called to a beautiful collection of chrysanthemums which was sent with Christian greetings by Mrs. Boyd, of Harrisburg, and their appreciation expressed by a vote of thanks to the donor.

After partaking of a lunch, which was furnished by the ladies of the Lutheran church, and an hour spent in free social intercourse, the ladies again came together for the transaction of business. They listened to an interesting account of the work of Miss Cathcart of Scotia Seminary for colored girls in South Carolina, given by her mother, Mrs. Hughes of Indiana. This was followed by some earnest words in regard to their work and responsibilities from Mrs. Grier, of Brooklyn, a member of the executive committee.

praise service with special reference to the ten years of the society's work. This was interspersed with many touching and pleasant reminiscences of the meetings. After prayer by the Rev. Mr. Heilman of the Lutheran church, the business meeting adjourned to meet in Lock Haven next year.

A popular meeting had been arranged for the evening. A large audience, among whom were many from the other congregations in Bloomsburg, gathered to hear the speakers announced. This meeting was presided over by the pastor of the church, Mrs. Devore, who had spent three years in Alaska under the auspices of the Board of Home Mission, held the congregation for a full hour in deepest attention as she described in vivid and graphic terms the work there as coming under her own supervision, with its gratifying results. D. McMillan followed, and for another hour discussed in eloquent and fitting words of the work in Utah and New Mexico, a work in which he was engaged for several years. At the close of the meeting all felt a new glow of enthusiasm with Home Mission and all parties resolved to be more active in its interests in the future.
