Selected Recipes.

Oyster Patties.—Old Virginia recipe: Make some rich puff paste and bake it in very small tin patty pans. When cool turn them out upon a large dish. Stew some large, fresh oysters with a little butter and as much oyster liquor as will cover them. When they have stewed a short time take them out of the pan, place upon a flat dish and set them away to cool. When quite cold lay a few oysters in each shell of puff paste.

Maple Sugar Sauce.—Melt over a slow fire, in a small teacupful of water half a pint of maple sugar. Let it slowly simmer. Remove all scum; add four table-spoonfuls of butter, mix with a level teaspoonful of flour and one of grated nutmeg; boil a few moments and serve with boiled puddings.

Rice Loaves.—Two cups boiled rice, two eggs beaten light, two table-spoonfuls melted butter, milk at discretion. Beat the rice smooth with a spoon, add the butter and eggs and enough milk to make a rather soft paste. Form this with the hands into small loaves, lay them in a dripping-pan and bake them, closely covered, for fifteen minutes. Uncover, stew with grated cheese and brown.

Pie Crust.—One heaping teacupful of baking powder, two quarts of flour, one teacupful of lard, two teacupfuls of water, a pinch of salt. Mix well and sift a little flour on the moulding board before rolling it out. This will make enough crust for four or five pies.

Brown Bread Ice Cream.—One quart of cream, half pound of sugar, three slices Boston brown bread, dried and toasted. Boil half the cream and dissolve the sugar in it. Add the uncooked cream and when cold freeze it. Crush and sift the brown bread, beat it into the frozen cream and let it stand packed in ice for three hours.
