THE ELECTION LAWS.  
DISABILITY OF VOTER. RIGHT TO ASSISTANCE.

Judge Wickham of Beaver county delivered the following opinion on November 7th:

I am asked to express an opinion on the meaning of the 27th section of the Act of June 19th, 1891, commonly called the Baker Ballot Law.

It is represented, that great difference of opinion, regarding the meaning of this section, exist among the voters and the election officers, and are likely to lead to trouble and confusion at the polls.

There being no case regularly before the court, I speak with some reluctance, and only the great importance, to all our citizens, of the questions presented and the seeming public necessity for some immediate utterances, cause me to say anything at all. It is proper also to add that this informal opinion cannot be held as binding on the court in the determination of any case which may come before it hereafter.

The 27th section of the Act provides that "if any voter declares to the Judge of election, that by reason of disability, he desires assistance in the preparation of his ballot, he shall be permitted, by the judge of election, to select a qualified voter of the election district to aid him." It will be observed that it is not the proof of disability, nor even its actual existence which, according to the plain language of the law, creates the condition entitling the voter to aid. It is enough that he shall declare his disability. He is the sole judge thereof. From his decision there can be no appeal, nor is it permissible to meet and overthrow his declaration, which need not be under oath, by proof of its falsity, except, perhaps, in a criminal prosecution for improperly showing his ballot.

As to the disability it may be physical or mental, or both combined. Among Webster's definitions of the word disability are the following: Incompetency, incapacity, want of competent physical or intellectual power. A voter's disability may result from ignorance of the law, inability to read or write, defective vision, palsy, excessive nervousness producing abnormal self-distrust, or other causes.

I do not think that the voter is obliged to state the nature of his disability. The law confers no power on election officers to force him to lay bare, perhaps in the presence of scoffing bystanders, specific or mental infirmities which most men, governed by a feeling common to humanity, seek to hide from even their closest friends.

In regard to the person who may be called on to aid a voter who declares his disability, the latter has the absolute right to select any qualified voter of the district. His choice must be respected by the election board.

The ballot bill as first presented, provided that the voter should specify, under oath, the nature of his disability, which save in the case of inability to read, was required to be physical, and the presiding election officer was then to appoint two persons to aid him. It was found impossible, however, to pass the bill in that shape, and it was amended, so as to make a general, unsworn declaration of disability sufficient, and to give the voter the right to select his own helper.

If it be conceded, that the election board, as is claimed by some, should try the question of disability, when objection is made, the voter, as a matter of common justice, may insist, that it be tried fully and fairly. Many witnesses, including oculists, or other specialists, might be called by the challenger and the party challenged, and the hearing of a single case could easily be made to cover the whole day of election. In the meanwhile voting would be blocked. A few obstructionists, acting collusively, might in this way disfranchise a whole district.
