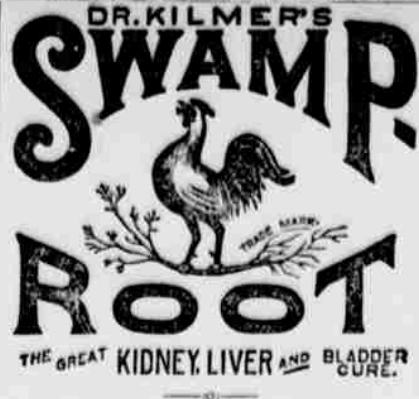

Salaries in Luzerne County.

The County Commissioners of Luzerne County met Monday of last week and fixed the salaries of the different County officials and clerks as follows:

Carlisle has accepted.

John G. Carlisle has prepared his resignation as a Senator from Kentucky, and will send it at once to Gov. Brown at Frankfort. Having decided to accept the Secretary of the Treasury, he thought it advisable, for several reasons, to retire from the Senate at an early day.

In the first place he wanted a little time in which to put his house in order for his new duties; and in the second place he saw the necessity of his successor being elected in time to participate in the organization of the new Senate. The Kentucky Legislature is now in session, and after being notified by the Governor of the vacancy it will proceed at once to the election of a Senator.

But the most important point as the Democratic leaders here view it, is that by freeing himself from all official cares at this time, Mr. Carlisle will be able to assist Mr. Cleveland with his counsels in settling many questions of great moment to the party and to the country. There is no man upon whose judgment Mr. Cleveland places a higher value and not one with whom he more freely consults, and it is the opinion here that between the day of his leaving the Senate and March 4, Mr. Carlisle will be frequently at Lakewood, or in direct communication with his chief and will assist Mr. Cleveland materially with his sound advice.

There is the highest authority for the statement that Mr. Carlisle wants Col. William R. Morrison seated at the Cabinet table with him, and it is believed that he will communicate the fact to Mr. Cleveland.
