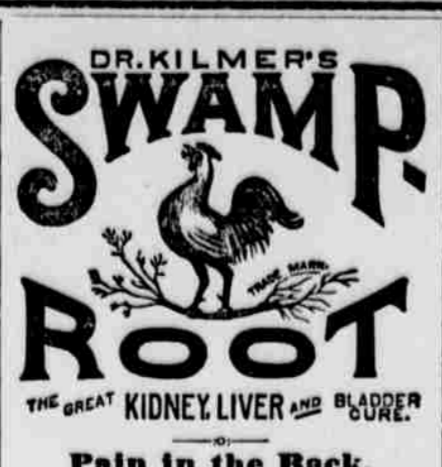

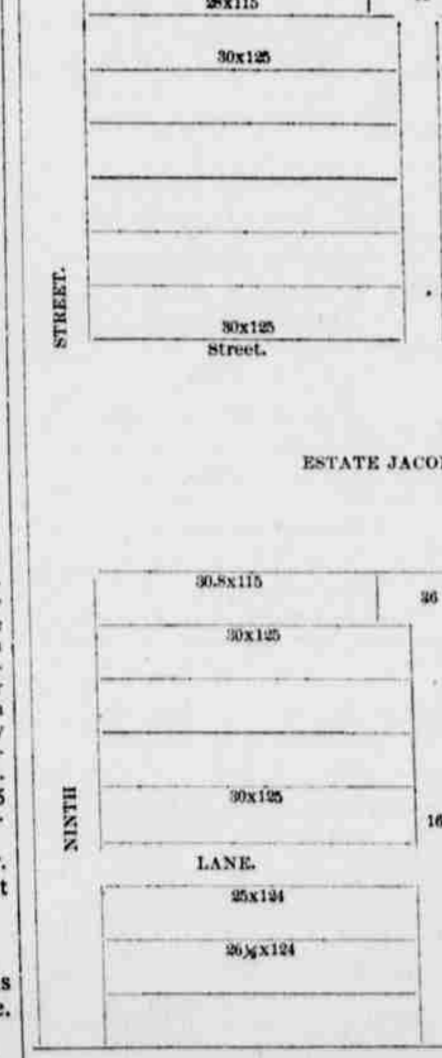

THE NEWS OF THE WEEK

Condensed Accounts of Important Happenings.

SOLID FACTS BRIEFLY MENTIONED.

The News Gathered from all Parts of the World and Put in Shape for the Convenience of the Busy Reader.

The Cambridge and Oxford rowing crews have arranged to come to the United States in June.

John Schlosser was cut in two by a Chicago and Alton train at Cameron Junction, Md.

Queen Victoria has consented to receive Cardinal Bausa at Florence as representative of the Pope.

Effa Ray, a 6-year-old girl living near Marietta, O., was burned to death by her clothing catching fire.

The National Plate Glass Company was incorporated at Springfield, Ill., with a capital of \$6,000,000.

The Hoag manufacturing block in Chicago was totally destroyed by fire, entailing a loss of over \$85,000.

The yarn spinning mill of the Rivett Company, in Stockport, England, burned to the ground. Loss, £50,000.

Memphis will have a cotton exhibit at Chicago. The committees making the selections have been very successful.

George P. Freeman and John W. Chesbro, furniture dealers at No. 101 Canal street, New York, have assigned.

Rev. Leonard M. Vincent, D. D., died in Poughkeepsie, N. Y. He was the father of Rev. Marlon R. Vincent, of this city.

Over 1,800 Italian emigrants were landed in New York from the steamers Ems, from Genoa, and the Alesia, from Marseilles.

Seven dwelling houses, a carpenter shop, a marble shop and a stable in Knoxville, a suburb of Pittsburg, were burned. Loss, \$30,000.

Governor Flower has signed the bill appropriating \$300,000 additional for the exhibit of New York state at the Columbian exposition.

The examination of the fifteen pool-sellers arrested in New York a week ago was adjourned in Jefferson Market police court until April 8.

Another case of smallpox in New Brunswick, N. J., has been reported. The victim is Alonzo Van Duser, a 18-year-old son of Grocer Van Duser.

The arrangements for a series of Evangelical meetings, to be conducted by Dwight L. Moody, in Chicago during the fair have been completed.

The National Association of Democratic clubs has issued a notice recommending a simultaneous celebration on April 18 of the birthday of Thomas Jefferson.

The elections in Cuba for members of the upper house in the Spanish cortes have resulted in the return of thirteen conservative and two autonomist senators.

John L. Hines murdered his wife and 8-year-old daughter near Seattle, Wash., and then committed suicide by pitching head foremost into a forty-five foot well.

Justice Van Sickle, of the supreme court of New Jersey heard testimony as to whether or not Barnegat park shall become a borough. He reserved his decision.

Phebe Ann Profit, who died at Providence, R. I., aged 101 years, was the oldest inhabitant of that state. Mrs. Profit leaves a sister aged 96 years and a brother aged 87.

The International Nickel Company, which owned the great nickel mine at Ridgely, Southern Oregon, has sold out to an English syndicate which is capitalized for \$8,000,000.
