Compulsory Education Law.

This bill passed the House finally on Tuesday. It has yet to go through the Senate, and the Governor's hands. The bill provides that parents and guardians of children between the age of 8 and 12 shall be required to send them to school in which the common English branches are taught during at least sixteen weeks in the year if any school within two miles of the pupil's home is open during the year, but this is not to apply to children otherwise instructed in common English branches for a like period of time.

The parents or guardians are under a penalty of \$2 for the first year's offense and \$5 for each subsequent one, but no penalty is collectable if the child cannot be paid on account of the poverty of the parents. Truant children are not to be reported to the authorities except after an absence from school of five successive days.
