THE SENATE ADJOURNS SINE DIE.

The Extraordinary Session Finished a 6 o'clock Saturday Night,

Washington, April 17.—After ascer-taining from the President that he no longer desired its presence, the senate adcorned sine die Saturday evening without acting on the resolution proposing investigations of Roach and Power, or on the pro-positions respecting the admission of the appointed senators or the right of Martin

to the Kansas seat.

At the last executive session Saturday afternoon every nomination made by the president up to date was confirmed, with the single exception of Hewson E. Lannan, to be United States marshal for Delaware, which was sent in Saturday. Under the rule a single objection was sufficient to carry the nomination over for a day, and Senator Higgins made that objection and

persisted in it.

Senator Gray sought to have it withdrawn, but Mr. Higgins was obdurate and exercised the privilege that belonged to him. Consequently the nomination remained unacted upon, it being understood that the president would re-appoint Lennan in the recess.
