The Big Park.

Captain Anderson, who commands the two troops of the Sixth Cavalry which guard the great Yellowstone National Park, says that from December to May the mountain sheep are in abundance in the park, and that scarcely a day passes that he does not see a dozen of them, but with the return of warm weather they retreat to their haunts in the fastness of the wildest mountains, and are not seen again until the cold weather drives them down.

The troops stationed in the park become skilled woodsmen and carry axes and rubber buckets attached to their saddles, instead of sabres. In the Winter they are forced to rely on snow shoes to a great extent, and most of the men in the captain's command are expert snowshoers, it being no uncommon occurence for two or three of them to be sent out on journeys of 100 to 150 miles.

The Norwegian skee is used by many of the troopers, and those who are experts in the use of them travel at marvelous speed on the down grades. Captain Anderson says that there is a road leading to his post which has a rather steep grade for four miles and he has known a man on skees to cover this distance in eleven minutes.

The Flood Causes Great Destruction in

Sr. VINCENT, May 3 .- This city, which has for several days been threatened with destruction by high water, is to-day almost entirely submerged, and half a dozen or more buildings have been totally wrecked by floating cakes of ice. Many persons have been driven from their homes, and more serious disaster than that already experienced is staring them in the face.

The village of Emerson, about three miles from here is also under water and all the stores are flooded. The Red river is run-ning through the lowlands east of St. Vin-cent and Emerson, leaving the two towns

The Flood at St. Louis.

Sr. Louis, May 3.—The floods here have not yet subsided, although the water in the river was but little if any higher to-day than it was at 7 o'clock last night. WURDERED BY NAVAJO INDIANS

We't Settlers Lose Their Lives at the Hands of the Redskins.

DENVER, Col., April 29. - The long threat ened war of the Navajo Indians against the settlers of the country in the vicinity of their lands has come at last, and with if was death of eight settlers.

Such was the startling news received, yesterday by Adjutant General Kennedy. He received a telegram from Lieutenant Plummer, Indian agent of the Navajos, it which he stated that eight men had been murdered by the Indians, who were now at war with settlers. He declared that the situation is a very critical one and asks that the troops be called out to prevent carther bloodshed.

The telegram was addressed to Governo. Waite, but he is out of town and the matter was referred to the adjutant general. Lieutenant Plummer stated that the people Lieutenant Plummer stated that the people below Durango are in a wild state of ex-citement, and grave fears are entertained lest the Indians should continue their war-fare along the valley. In his message the lieutenant states that two battles have been fought already. The first was early Thurs-day, when five men were killed, all settlers, while at another encounter three more los-thals lives.

MARSEILLES, May 2 .- During the May Day celebration here yesterday the socialists, by waving red flags and making other demonstrations, precipitatated a riot which the police tried to break up and in doing so were badly beaten and cut by the

The Rebellion in Cuba.

MADRID, May 3.—A deputation of Cuban senators and deputies, including several autonomists, waited upon Senor Maura, minister of the colonies, yesterday, to protest against the Cuban revolt. The minister replying, assured them that the government would not hesitate to make any sacrifice to maintain Spanish rule in Cuba, but that, unless the situation became worse, he considered the colonial army strong enough to conquer the rebels. trong enough to conquer the rebels.

A Regatta for the Foreign Sailors. NEW YORK, May 2.—A series of boen races are to be indulged in by crews of the foreign warships next Saturday on the North river. The regatta is open to all sailors on the visiting ships, but American tars will not be permitted to enter, another regatta for them exclusively having seen arranged for the same day.
