lome of Iss Provisions-Greater Cenveni ences for Debtors.

HARRISSUNO, June 7 .- Under the new HARRISURO, June 7. -- Under the new holiday and half holiday law, approves May 31 by the governor, New Year's Day Washington's Birthday, Good Friday, Me morial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day November election day, Thankagiving Day Christmas Day, and any other day ap pointed or recommended by the president or the governor for religious observance are holidays, and all Saturdays not thus made holidays are half holidays from 15 o'clock noon

Whenever New Year's Day, Washing ton's Birthday, Independance Day, or Christmas Day occurs on Sunday, the following Monday is to be observed as the holiday. Whenever Memorial Day (May 30) falls on Sunday, the preceding Satur-day is to be observed as the holiday. Labor Day occurs on the first Saturday of Sep-tember, November election day is the first Tuesday after the first Monday of Novem bar.

Time bills of exchange, checks, drafts, and promissory notes made after the pass age of the law, and maturing by their terms on any such bolidays, half holidays, or on Sundays, are tot payable or present able for payment or icceptance, nor pro-testable for non-payment or non-accept-ance, until the next succeeding secular or

business day. Sight or demand checks, drafts, bills of exchange, and promissory notes are pay-able before 12 o'clock on half holidays, but are not protestable for non-payment or non-acceptance until the next succeeding secular or business day, and no liability is incurred through failure to present or protest sight or demand items on half holi-

days. Under the half holiday law approved May 31, Pebruary election day, which oc-curs on the third Tuesday of February, is a legal half holiday from 12 o'clock noon; and all hills of exchange, checks, drafts, and notes made after the passage of the law that are presentable for acceptance or payment on such half holiday, are deemed to be payable and to be presentable for ac-ceptance or payment at or before 12 o'clock of such half holiday, and are then protest-able for non-neuronal such as the protestable for non-payment or non-acceptance.





It is the governor's intention to dispose of the bills as rapidly as possible.

As presi-tent of the State board of agriculture, the governor is empowered to appoint the dairy and food commissioner. It is claimed by the state administration that under the provisions of the new act relating to the employment and safety of women and children in manufacturing establishments, and the appointment of inspectors to en-force the same, the governor has the right to appoint a factory inspector at once, and he re-appointed Robert Watchorn, who was rejected by the senate, and over whom the senate and governor had some trouble. Under the new act Watchorn's salary is doubled from \$1,500 to \$3,000 per year. He is given \$4,000 for expenses and will ap-point tweive deputies instead of six under the old act.
