Tammany Will Ask Cleveland to Attend Its Big Celebration.

New York, June 6.—A meeting of the Tammany Society was held in the Wigwam last night to consider the arrangements for the Fourth of July celebration.

President Cleveland, the members of the cabinet, all the democratic governors, the United States Senators and about fifty members of the lower house will receive invitations.

There has been some gossip to the effect that President Cleveland would not receive an invitation on account of his recent treatment of Tammany and the state democracy, but this course will not be followed.

New York, June 7.—Edwin Booth, the great tragedian, quietly passed away at his apartments in the Players' Club at 1:15 this morning.



The death of the renowned actor, which had been expected at any time during the past two days, was peaceful, being scarcely noticeable to the anxious watchers at his bedside.

Edwin Booth was born in Belair, near Baltimore, Md., on November 13, 1833.

WHEAT TAKES ANOTHER DROP.

Apprehension in the Chicago Produce Market—A Small Trader Falls.

CHICAGO, June 6.—Wheat prices were over a cent off yesterday, breaking the record again for low prices in this market.

The announcement of the suspension of Meadowcroft Bros. confirmed the fear, but caused no particular additional break in prices.

The Forest Fires in Minnesota.

MINNEAPOLIS, June 7.—A destructive forest fire is raging in Stevens county, this state. It started in a dense pine forest Saturday last, and has gained terrible headway.

The Quarantine Bill Signed.

HARRISBURG, June 6.—House bill No. 179, known as the Bilis quarantine bill, which passed the senate and house of representatives on May 29, received the signature of Governor Pattison yesterday afternoon.

The Gold Below \$90,000,000.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—The treasury department last evening learned of the shipment of \$1,000,000 ordered from New York today. This leaves the net gold holdings in the treasury \$89,334,326.

A Texas Bank Goes Under.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—Comptroller Eckels was informed yesterday that the Merchants' National bank, of Fort Worth, Tex., capital \$250,000 had failed.

NEWS FROM THE STATE CAPITAL.

Major Lockhard, superintendent of public grounds, is again at his post after a long and severe illness.

Chief Clerk O. R. Snyder, of the state department, is seriously ill at Ebensburg, where he has been several weeks.

A meeting of the board of public buildings and grounds will be held next week to take up the new building matter.

Uncle Amos Mylin, of Lancaster, will be a candidate for the republican nomination for auditor general next year.

Attorney General Hensel will deliver the address to the seventeen graduates from the Dickinson school of law, at Carlisle, next Tuesday.

Governor Pattison has vetoed the special act repealing the bounty on fox and mink scalps so far as it applies to Greene county. He says it is unconstitutional.

B. J. Heywood, of Mercer, who is making a race for the republican nomination for state treasurer, has been endorsed by Mercer, Lawrence and Blair conventions.

William N. Reynolds, of Wyoming, who has just left a good position in Washington, would like the republican nomination for secretary of internal affairs next year.

Governor Pattison has signed the act providing for the erection of the Western Pennsylvania Institution for Feeble-Minded Children. A commission will select the site and contract for its erection.

The writ of quo warranto asked for by Attorney General Hensel against the Traction Company and the Union Passenger Railway Company, of Philadelphia, will not be argued for some time, defendants having thirty days in which to answer.

Two years ago the house appropriation committee had referred to it \$24 million, involving an expenditure of \$26,480,328.92. Of these \$4 were negative and the committee granted a total sum of \$20,341,541.29, reducing the demands \$6,138,787.63.

THE NEW STATE HOLIDAY LAW.

Some of Its Provisions—Greater Convenience for Debtors.

HARRISBURG, June 7.—Under the new holiday and half holiday law, approved May 31 by the governor, New Year's Day, Washington's Birthday, Good Friday, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, November election day, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Day, and any other day appointed or recommended by the president or the governor for religious observance are holidays, and all Saturdays not thus made holidays are half holidays from 11 o'clock noon.

Whenever New Year's Day, Washington's Birthday, Independence Day, or Christmas Day occurs on Sunday, the following Monday is to be observed as the holiday. Whenever Memorial Day (May 30) falls on Sunday, the preceding Saturday is to be observed as the holiday. Labor Day occurs on the first Saturday of September, November election day is the first Tuesday after the first Monday of November.

Time bills of exchange, checks, drafts, and promissory notes made after the passage of the law, and maturing by their terms on any such holiday, half holiday, or on Sundays, are not payable or presentable for payment or acceptance, nor protestable for non-payment or non-acceptance, until the next succeeding secular or business day.

Sight or demand checks, drafts, bills of exchange, and promissory notes are payable before 12 o'clock on half holidays, but are not protestable for non-payment or non-acceptance until the next succeeding secular or business day, and no liability is incurred through failure to present or protest sight or demand items on half holidays.

Under the half holiday law approved May 31, February election day, which occurs on the third Tuesday of February, is a legal half holiday from 12 o'clock noon, and all bills of exchange, checks, drafts, and notes made after the passage of the law that are presentable for acceptance or payment on such half holiday, are deemed to be payable and to be presentable for acceptance or payment at or before 12 o'clock of such half holiday, and are then protestable for non-payment or non-acceptance.

WAS TOO STRONG FOR HIS BROTHER.

Edward Banach Jumps from a Roof to Death in New York.

NEW YORK, June 2.—Edward Banach, 30 years old, a plumber living in the five-story tenement No. 428 East Eighteenth street, attempted suicide by jumping from the roof. He was taken to the Presbyterian hospital and probably will die.

His brother, George, who is an invalid and has only one arm, followed him to the roof and endeavored to stop him from jumping. The two brothers struggled, but George was unable to hold his brother back.

Guinard Held for Embezzlement.

PHILADELPHIA, June 5.—Harry Guinard, residing at No. 1838 Arch street, with an office at No. 1833 Arch street, was held in \$1,500 bail by Magistrate Devlin on three charges of embezzlement, \$600 bond being required in each. Guinard is accused by James McCormick, of No. 887 Bergdoll street, with the embezzlement of \$612; John P. McCoy, of No. 2224 Walnut street, charges up a shortage against him of \$210.29, being the amount due the estate of the late John Carr, while Cornelius Myers, of No. 2909 Girard avenue, says that the accused owes him profits amounting to \$375.

Little Borden Fainted.

NEW BEDFORD, Mass., June 7.—In the Lizzie Borden murder trial yesterday when the prosecutor had closed his opening address to the jury in the celebrated case, Miss Borden fainted and remained in an unconscious condition for several minutes.

When she was restored to her natural state court adjourned to allow the jury to go to Fall River to examine the Borden homestead where the tragedy for which Miss Borden is being tried occurred.

A Whole Family Murdered.

CLARENCEVILLE, Que., June 5.—The dead bodies of Mr. and Mrs. Eddy and their daughter were found Saturday in their home at Beacon Ridge, a few miles below here. To all appearances they were murdered during the night. The motive for the crime is not known, as the victims were poor and robbery could have had no part in it.

Tomorrow at the Fair.

CHICAGO, June 5.—The Fair program for tomorrow, so far as relates to the religious exercises, hangs fire, although there is but little time to make arrangements. Choral Director Tomlin is ready to provide the choir of 200 voices to lead in the congressional singing and render anthems.

A Cyclone in Indiana.

RICHMOND, Ind., June 5.—A message from Hagerstown says that a cyclone passed over the northwest part of Wayne county. At Economy the residence of Mr. Lowe was completely destroyed and considerable other damage done. No lives were lost.

Captured the Robbers.

LEBANON, June 5.—Thursday night the clothing store of Levi Siv was entered by breaking open the front door of the store and robbed of about \$700 worth of goods. The robbers were caught near Sheridan station yesterday afternoon.

Cyclone Victims Suffering.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., June 5.—Great distress exists in Hope, Ark., and the vicinity, among the victims of the cyclone of May 30. At least 5,000 people are homeless and destitute. They obtain with difficulty barely enough food to sustain life.

Nine Lives Were Lost.

VICTORIA, B. C., June 3.—The steamer Tacoma, which arrived from Yokohama, brings news that the Russian corvette Nitara went ashore on the Corvan coast May 15, and became a total wreck. Nine lives were lost.

Two Killed and Thirteen Injured.

BERLIN, June 5.—A cart load of gunpowder was exploded yesterday afternoon on a street in Kips, Rhenish Prussia, by a spark from a pipe. The two men on the cart were killed and thirteen other persons were injured.
