GENERAL NEWS.

A terrific cyclone passed over some of the western states last week Thursday. At Pomeroy, Iowa, forty four people were killed, and 108 injured. Two hundred residences were completely demolished, and all of the churches.

The reports of President Cleveland's ill health are greatly exaggerated. The story of the cancerous growth in his mouth is entirely untrue. He had some trouble with his teeth, and one of them was extracted.

Wild beasts supposed to have escaped from a menagerie, are roaming at large in the northern part of Lancaster county, and the inhabitants are greatly alarmed.

Associate Justice Blatchford of the United States supreme court died last Friday. F. R. Conder of New York is spoken of as his probable successor.

The coke workers and miners along the Sewickley branch are experiencing a season of unrest because of the closing of mines and blowing out of ovens. Over 200 ovens at Mammoth, about 50 at Trauger and 40 at Hecla have been banked throwing five or six hundred men out of work. It is stated that others will close next week.

Lieut. Peary and his arctic exploring party sailed from Portland, Maine, last week, in the steamer Falcon which was purchased and equipped for the occasion.

The Duke of Veragua, the descendant of Christopher Columbus, who recently visited this country, is in financial trouble. During his visit here his estates were seized by his creditors. A movement has been started in Chicago to assist him financially.

The Infanta Eulalie has reached her home in Spain, and declares herself very much pleased with her visit to America. Wonder what she thought of the people who toadied to her and tried to ape court manners!

D. S. Krieder, wife and five children were murdered at Cando, North Dakota, last week by Albert Bomberger, a nephew of Krieder, who worked for him. The murderer has been captured. Krieder moved west from Lebanon county, this state fifteen years ago. The seven bodies were brought back to Lebanon county for burial.

A negro named Miller was hanged by a mob at Bardwell, Kentucky last Friday because he was suspected of the murder of two girls named Ray. There seemed to be no doubt of his guilt, but subsequent developments make it appear that he was not the right man.

timed speech against the Roman Catholics, and as the population is very largely of that faith, it created much indignation and nearly resulted in a riot. The police were called out for protection.

The Republican State convention will be held in Harrisburg on August 30th.

A charge of dynamite was exploded last Saturday night under the home of Rev. John Gulcz, pastor of the Polish church of Mt. Carmel. A portion of the parsonage was wrecked and the handsome windows of the church were shaken to pieces.

A wind-storm of terrific force, followed by a heavy downpour of rain, passed over the World's Fair last Sunday evening, doing considerable damage to the different buildings and to the exhibits stored therein. No one was hurt.

A flimsily constructed building, erected by the Hercules iron company, of Chicago, used as a cold storage warehouse and ice skating rink, and situated near the Sixty-fourth street entrance to the exposition grounds, burned to the ground in a little over an hour last Monday afternoon, sending to death, at least eighteen men and injuring nineteen others.

The full extent of the death wrought may never be known, as the building collapsed totally in so short a time after the fire started, that many people who entered the building hoping to render aid before the peril under which they were placing themselves was realized, were caught like rats in a trap and went unannounced to their doom.

Seventy five convicts in the house of correction at Iona, Mich. attempted to escape last Monday. They were driven back and subdued by the guards, after a hand to hand conflict.

The Sunday attendance at the World's Fair is not what was expected, and is getting smaller. It is probable that some action will be taken soon, looking towards Sunday closing. Workingmen have not turned out as was expected, and many of the exhibitors favor closing the gates on Sunday.

Peter Baur, of Wilkes-Barre, has been appointed special pension detective for Luzerne, Lackawanna, Columbia and Montour counties.

Hughesville had two fires on the Fourth. The finishing and wareroom of the Hughesville Furniture Co. was burned.

It is probable that Emperor William of Germany will visit the World's Fair in September.

Five hundred school teachers of Philadelphia started for the World's Fair on Monday, in two parties.

It has been said that a French family could live well on the waste from an American table. The foundations have been laid in the World's Fair grounds of a structure in which it is intended to teach the American housewife how to prevent this woeful waste, and how to utilize the cheaper meats and coarser food products in the production of appetizing and nourishing dishes.

Car Loads of Human Bones. PIEDRAS NEGRAS, Mexico, July 9.—Among the large shipments of bones from Mexico to the United States recently made for fertilizing and sugar refining purposes were ten car loads of human, said to have been obtained from ancient mounds in Southern Mexico, but more probably gathered from various old and abandoned cemeteries. As these bones are fragments from different skeletons, 50,000 individuals are represented in the lot.

Thousands of Miners Idle. IANPEMING, Mich., July 10.—The Mayor of the city has recommended that the council stop all municipal work other than absolutely necessary, as all the money the city can raise will be needed to support the miners and their families during the winter. The Winthrop mine has now closed down and over 1,000 miners are now idle in Ishpeming alone, and 8,000 in this district.

A Comet in the Northern Sky. SEATTLE, Wash., July 10.—A comet was visible in the Northern Sky last night some degrees below and three or four degrees to the west of the Polar Star and near the top of the Great Star. The comet was seen just before 11 o'clock. The course is downward, and it is about 15 degrees above the horizon. The tail is but a few degrees in length, although the nucleus is very bright.

What Are Dr. McGlynn's Plans? NEW YORK, July 10.—Dr. McGlynn, who arrived here Saturday evening and went at once to the Pierpoint House, Brooklyn, declares that he is not yet ready to disclose his plans for the future, and declines to answer questions. It is said that in the fall he will begin the performance of whatever duty is assigned him.

Maybe Interstate Troubles. NEW YORK, July 10.—The lynching of Charles J. Miller, the negro, at Bardwell, Ky., may become an inter-State affair. He was captured at Silkston, in Missouri, and taken back to the scene of his alleged crime without the formality of requisition. It is said the authorities of Missouri will take the matter up.

Shot Her Fiance. SAN FRANCISCO, July 10.—Late last night Nellie Horton, a telegraph operator shot and instantly killed C. R. Hazan, an Oakland motorist in a lodging house on Emmy street. It is conjectured she demanded Hazan to fulfill promises and marry her and he refused. The woman is in custody.

Will Not Fight on the 24th. NEW YORK, July 10.—The famous middleweights, Jack Dempsey and Billy Smith, will not meet on July 24 to contend for the championship of their class and a \$6,000 purse. The Coney Island Athletic club's board of directors decided to postpone the event.

Price May See for Damages. HACKENSACK, N. J., July 10.—Ex-Governor Price visited his home in Oakland, Bergen county, N. J., yesterday and returned to Sheriff Bogert this morning. It is said that the ex-Governor will bring suit for damages against the persons who caused his arrest.

The Dive Broke His Spine. ROCKAWAY BEACH, L. I., July 10.—William Platt, of 225 Nassau avenue, Brooklyn, while bathing this afternoon at Rockaway Park, broke his spine by diving off a bathing pavilion into shallow water. He will probably die. He is 45 years old and married.

Death of Hiram Camp. NEW HAVEN, July 10.—Hiram Camp, ex-president of the New Haven Clock company, died at his home in Fair Haven late Saturday evening. Mr. Camp had been in poor health for a year or more.

NEWS OF THE WEEK.

There has been no further run on the First National Bank at Pueblo, Col., since Monday afternoon.

F. G. Chamberlain, late auditor of the Atlanta & Danville railroad, has been missing for some days.

The lighthouse keeper at Cape Race, N. F., reports that a large iceberg is aground nine miles southwest of that station.

Mr. Robertson, the newly appointed American Consul at Hamburg, is timed to arrive at his post the first week in August.

Senator Martin is very sick at his home in Topeka, Kas. Physicians have denied all callers, and say his condition is critical.

Dr. Eli J. Henkle, of Baltimore, an ex-member of Congress, is lying at the point of death at the Grand Pacific Hotel in Chicago.

Rafter, one of the convicts who escaped from Clinton prison Wednesday last was captured about 20 miles from Plattsburgh, N. Y.

The Troy, N. Y., Steel and Iron Company shut down its plant Monday last. One thousand men are thrown out of employment.

The bi-annual meeting of the German Chess Association will open at Kiel on July 11. There will be a national masters' tournament. The first prize will be 500 marks.

Lewis A. Brown was drowned in the Chango river about two miles from Binghamton, N. Y., while in swimming. He was 18 years old, and lived in Washington, D. C.

Nine shipwrecked American seamen arrived from Prince Edward Islands Saturday on the steamer Worcester and went on to Boston. They are the crew of the lost steamer Werhira.

Edwin J. Binford, a coal dealer, of Denver, Col., has assigned for the benefit of his creditors. B. J. Spencer is named as assignee. Mr. Binford places his assets at \$218,770 and liabilities \$78,804.94.

Bondsman have been secured for ex-governor R. M. Price, who has been in the custody of Sheriff Bogert at Hackensack for the past month in default of \$30,000 bonds for contempt of the New Jersey court of Chancery.

John Hitchcock and George McFarland, two gas well drillers, while making repairs on top of a derrick at Portland, Ind., fell 60 feet to the ground. Hitchcock, who lived in Lima, was instantly killed, and McFarland had both arms and both legs broken.

Further reports from the districts swept by the storm in New York and Brooklyn on Saturday evening are to the effect that the damage in both cities will amount to about \$35,000. Along the Jersey coast the damage was not so great as first reported.

On the night of July 4, George Arbanasin, proprietor of a resort three miles from Stockton, Cal., was found murdered at his place. Louis H. Schultz, an ex-sailor has surrendered to the police and confessed having killed Arbanasin. Schultz was locked up.

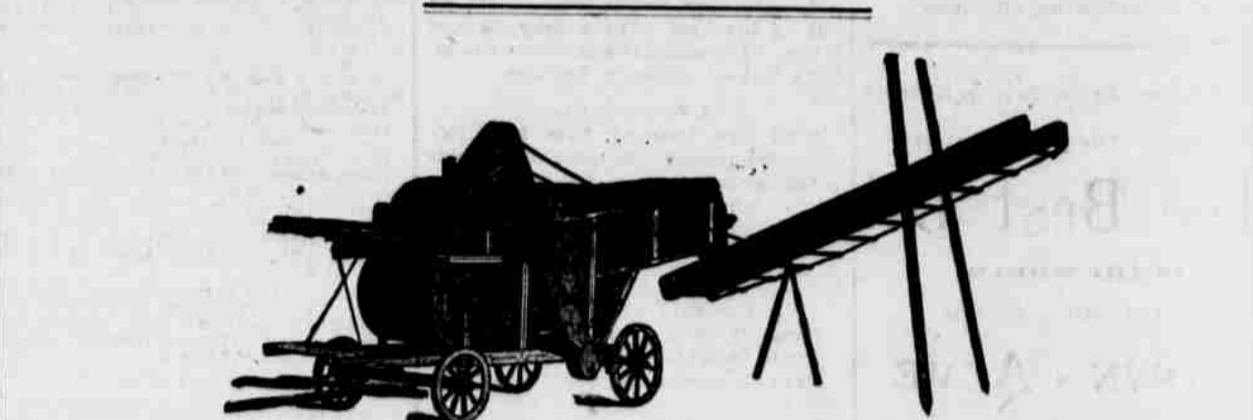

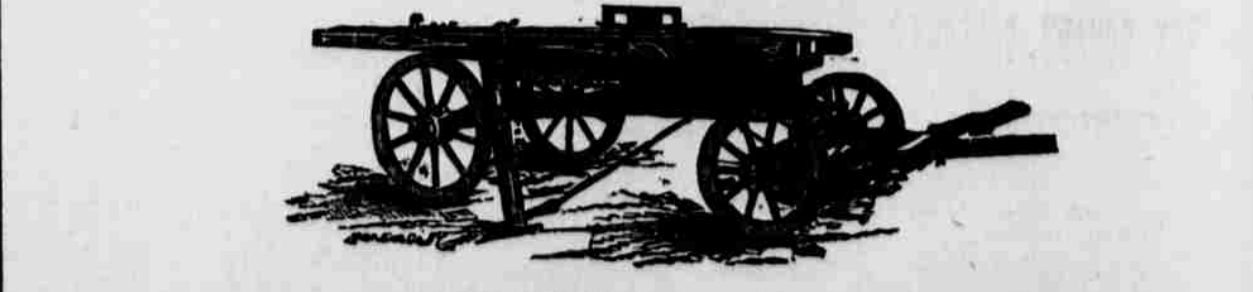
