Invitations to Church Weddings.

If a reception card is enclosed, a written acceptance is enclosed or declination of both invitations should be sent at least a week before the wedding. "At Home" cards should be left as for "Teas," though for evening receptions it is not usual to leave cardsa card-case not forming a necessary part of any evening costume. And finally it may be that some prompt acknowledgement should be made to every form of social invitations, or the recipient will be guilty of a breach of etiquette.
