It is a long time since we have said anything about unpaid subscriptions, but when our books show thousands of dollars outstanding that we ought to have, and need constantly in our business, it is pardonable if we use these columns occasionally to remind those who owe us, that a newspaper cannot be published on wind. There are some who owe for three years or more, and who pay no attention to statements sent by mail. To such, notice is now given that their accounts must be settled before January 1st. If not paid by that time, they will be charged \$1.50 a year, and costs may be made. All who owe for one, two or three years are respectfully requested to call and settle, at \$1.00 a year. After an account is three years old it is liable to be charged at the rate of \$1.50 a year, as that is the price when not paid in advance. We are compelled to give this notice because of the large sums due us that are scattered all over the county, and as there is certainly nothing unreasonable in the request, we trust that it will meet with a cheerful response.
