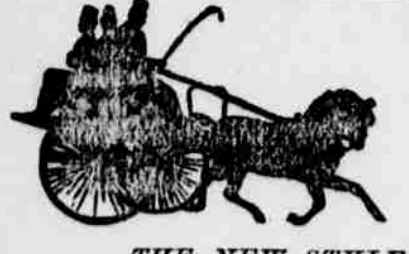

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS.

BLOOMSBURG, Nov. 9, 1893. Regular meeting of Council, with President and all members present. Petition was offered asking for grade on East Third street. Upon motion it was granted, and Engineer directed to give the grade. G. B. Martin presented a bill for service as policeman for two months \$10.00. Mr. Gorrey moved, seconded by Mr. Swentzel, to refer the matter to the Solicitor and determine whether he is a policeman. Mr. A. C. Creasy presented the claim of a road machine. On motion the subject was referred to Committee on Highways.

Complaint was made that occupants of residences at corner of Fourth and East streets were throwing slops and coal ashes on the street. It was referred to the Board of Health. Mr. Housel moved that the Water Company be notified to put Iron street in same condition as they found it, within five days, or the town will do it at their expense with 20 per cent. added. Agreed to unanimously.

Mr. Holmes moved that the property owners on west corner of Fifth and Catharine streets be notified to raise their pavements to grade within thirty days, or the town will do it at their expense with 20 per cent. added.

Mr. Peacock moved that the property owners be notified to grade and lay their pavements within thirty days, and to lay them of the same width as they are laid between Second and Third streets. Agreed to.
