The regular July meeting of the Town Council was held at usual place last Thursday night with President F. P. Drinker and members Stephen Knorr, Isaac Yost and C. B. Sterling present.

Minutes of last regular and special meetings read and approved.

A petition signed by a number of property holders on East First street was presented asking that the sewer be extended up said street east of Iron.

On motion the consideration of this matter was laid over until next meeting.

An ordinance was read and duly passed prohibiting the riding of bicycles upon any pavement or sidewalk within the Town limits. For violation of this ordinance the one so offending shall be fined not more than \$5 or less than \$2 and costs for the first offense, and not more than \$10 or less than \$5 and costs for the second offense.

Permits were granted as follows: To A. J. Evans for frame laundry on Iron street below Second. To Wm. Ferguson for brick house on lower side of Market street below the D. L. & W. railroad.

Jacob Dieffenbach appeared and entered complaint as to the condition of outhouses on the Waller properties near Tenth street. No formal report having been made by the Sanitary Committee or Board of Health, the matter was laid over for the present.
