Mr. Zimmerman is the crack bicyclist who floats through the air with the greatest of speed. He not only wins at home but abroad. In a recent 5-mile race with Barden, in Paris, his competitor left the track after covering two miles in the vain attempt to keep up. Zimmerman, without the stimulating influence of a lively competitor in the rear, covered his five miles in eleven minutes and fifty-nine and two-fifths seconds. That's getting along at the rate of a mile in less than two and a half minutes. It beats Berwick record also.
