President Cleveland and his cabinet are almost swamped with telegrams from every section of the country congratulating them on the courage and promptness with which they have brought order out of chaos and prevented what at one time looked like it might be a revolution, and volunteering aid to any imaginable extent, in both men and money. The President and his advisers believe that the worst is over, but they none the less feel proud of the confidence reposed in them by Congress and the people and will continue their efforts to deserve that confidence.
