I can feed two horses on wheat five days for 57c, and on corn one and one half days for 58c, and my horses will be in better shape fed on the wheat than on corn. I make these figures from the present prices of wheat and corn in the mark et here at this time. I buy the best wheat I can get .- New York Tribune.
