WHEAT AS FEED FOR HORSES.

On account of the short crop of corn and oats in this State, writes W. E. Chapin of Iowa, I have been feeding wheat to my horses. I commenced to feed one pint of well soaked wheat to each horse, and I increased the amount to one quart after it is soaked. I now turn my horse from my feed cooker into the vessel containing the wheat and I steam it for about fifteen minutes, leaving it to stand in the hot water until used or until it becomes cool. My horses work every day on the farm, and I have never had them look so well, fat and sleek. I can feed two horses on wheat five days for 57c, and on corn one and one-half days for 58c, and my horses will be in better shape fed on the wheat than on corn. I make these figures from the present prices of wheat and corn in the market here at this time. I buy the best wheat I can get.—New York Tribune.
