A Bill to Prevent the Sale of Impure Meat by Inspection.

THE CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

Not a Cent for Them If the Demands of the State Institutions Are Allowed -Billy for the Protection of Game and of Insurance Policy Holders.

(Special Correspondence.)

BARRISBURG, March 17.-The grangers are back of a bill introduced in the senate by Senator Snyder for the inspection of meats offered for sale. There was a meet ing of the legislative committee of the State Grange here last week, at which resolutions were adopted favoring the speedy enactment of the measure. Under the provisions of the bill the president of the state board of health will appoint one or more persons in each city, berough or township in the state to inspect the meats. Their duties will consist in inspecting all meats slaughtered or shipped to within their districts.

The receiver of a consignment of meat must notify the inspector as soon as it arrives, and cannot sell any portion of it un-til it is inspected. If the meat is pure the inspector will attach a certificate of inspection. The inspectors will receive \$2 for each whole carcass of beef, and fifty cents for each quarter; for sheep, yeal and swine \$1 will be paid, and for a quarter carcase of the same twenty five cents is allowed.

The receiver of the meats pays for the inspection. Farmers slaughtering stock of their owr raising for sale are exempted from the provisions of the act. If the consignce of meats neglects to have meat inspected or refuses to pay the charges he will be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and pay a fine not exceeding \$200, or be imprisoned for more than thirty days. The fines go to the county treasury. The inspectors are to make monthly returns to the treasurer of the county or city for which they are appointed, and must pay over 50 per cent. of the gross fees collected. The act only applies to fresh meat.

Not a Cent Left for Charity,

If the demands of the state institutions are allowed there will not be one cent for charity the next two years. The public schools will have to have \$11,000,000. To meet this and the running expenses of the state \$15,253,000 will be required. The National Guard wants \$700,000. The maintenance of the indigent insane and asylums will cost \$1,000,000. The semi-state institutions, such as the homes for feeble minded and the schools for the deaf, blind and dumb, will require \$1,500,000. The penal institutions must be looked after. It has been found by the state authorities that these amounts will eat up the \$19,-000,000 income for the next two years, and thus leave not a cent for charity.

A number of prominent officers of the National Guard have been here during the past week, advocating a plan to provide armories for the various commands throughout the state. Among them were Colonels Case and Ripple, Majors Keen and Warman and Captain Louis R. Walters, all of whom were members of the executive committee of the organization of National Guard officers formed here at the time of the inauguration of Governor Hastings.

One plan suggested was to have the legislature appropriate \$5,000 to each com-pany, and then save the \$200 annually appropriated for armory rent. As there are 160 companies in the guard, however, and but little money in the treasury, this plan was quickly given up as impracticable. The other appeared in a much more favorable light, however. It is merely to increase the annual rent appropriation from \$200 to \$400, which would allow the comon a mortgage at 5 per cent., the state to protect itself by taking title to the property. This plan would require an increase of only \$32,000 in the annual appropriation to the guard. The great importance of the improvement to the Delaware river channel may help to secure that appropriation of \$500,-000, or at least a good portion of it. The Philadelphia members of both political parties are bending every effort to getting votes for the bill, and they count a great deal on the impression to be made by having Messrs, Cook, Higbee and Tucker repeat their arguments on the necessity of the work before the entire house.

Is punishable with a fine of \$100 or imprisonment of six months.

A bill aimed at the voluntary relief as-sociations of the Pennsylvania and Philadelphia and Rending Railroad companies has been put in the house by Representative West, of Berks. It provides that it shall be unlawful for any corporation, firm, person or persons doing business in the state to compel any of its employes to take out policies of insurance in any accident, casualty or liability company in which they are interested and in which the cost of the policy is to be deducted from the wages of the employes so in-sured. It is punishable by a fine, 15 per cent. of which shall go to the attorney prosecuting the case

Of Interest to the Insured.

A bill of much interest to insurance men and policy holders is pending in the house. It provides that no policy of life or endowment insurance issued by any company incorporated, organized or doing business within the state shall become forfeited or two full annual premiums have been paid, but said policy shall be binding on the company for an amount of paid up insur-ance which the then net valve of the policy, less any indebtedness of the insured to the company and a surrender charge, on that steamer. cash and paid up value of the policy at each anniversary, if the policy is for a less period than twenty years. If a life policy or for more than twenty years the com-pany shall place in the body of the policy the values of the same for a period of not less than twenty years. This act shall be binding on all the companies to which it applies, any condition in the policy to the contrary notwithstanding, and any waiver by the insured shall be void.

The religious garb bill passed the final stage in the house last Tuesday with only twenty-six dissenting votes. The measure makes it a misdemeanor for any teacher to wear a religious garb or insignla of any kind in the public schools. The most novel scene over witnessed in the house oc curred during the discussion on this question. Represensentative Spangler, of Carlisle, a member of the American Protective Association, in speaking of the bill, donounced the Roman Catholic church and its head, to whom he referred as "that man Pope Leo." Upon approaching his peroration Spangler took from his desk a small American flag, which he waived over his head until called down by Speaker Walton.

The Abelition of Night Sessions.

The house has abolished night session on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays, and is now holding two sessions a day from 10 in the morning to 1 in the afternoon and from 3 to 6 in the afternoon The change was made in order that the committees might have more time to consider bills pending before them. Both bodies are doing effective work and the chances are that they will be ready to adjourn by the middle of May. Two weeks ago a resolution was introduced in the house favoring the final adjournment for April 25, but the resolution has never been called up. If it is it will be defeated, as the members are satisfied they cannot com plete the work before them by that time. Senator Penrose presided in the senate last week in the absence of Llutenant Governor Lyon and President Pro Tem. Thomas. This seems to have a peculiar significance. There are indications that Sen ator Quay intends to emphasize his friend-ship for Penrose and his opposition to David Martin, who prevented the latter from securing the Republican nomination for mayor of Philadelphia, by having the young senator elected president pro tem. to succeed Senator Thomas. An easy way to start a Penrose boom among the sena tors would be to give them a chance to observe how efficiently the Philadelphian can fill the presiding officer's chair. Attorney General Olney may or may not be personally opposed to an income tax, but if he is opposed it is certainly not upon constitutional grounds, or he could not have made the great and masterly argument he did last week, before the Supreme Court, in favor of the Constitutional right of Congress to impose an income tax. Mr. Olney is no orator, in the popular conception of the word, but there was a confidence in the tone in which he talked in a plain, matter of fact, straightforward way to the court, showing that a decision against the constitutionality of the income tax would reverse no less than five previous decisions of the Supreme Court, which was far more convincing to ordinary minds than the tricks of oratory resorted to by some of his opponents. The Supreme Court took a two weeks recess day, in order to prepare decisions in this and other important cases. Should the decision be against the income tax the Treas ury would be very much embarrassed on account of the consequent loss of revenue, and an early extra session of Congress might have to be called. Already nearly \$20,000 income tax has been paid into the Treasury. Ex Representative McAleer, came



The Riter Tax Bill Doomed.

This very condition of the treasury will prevent the passage, at this session at least, of the Riter tax bill. Even its advocates admit that it would result in a deficit, and the more progressive members are urging the retention of the present law. with the addition of a few amendments to increase the revenue, rather than the certainty of a decrease and lots of litigation under the proposed law. Ex-State Treasurer Boyer, who prepared the present law, has been at the capitol for several days, and will appear before the ways and means committee some time this week to discuss the features of the proposed bill.

Governor Hastings is extremely anxious to aid the charitable institutions, and now has the state's accounting officers at work to see if they cannot figure out an increased revenue for the next two years. The state board of charities has figured out that it will need \$5,000,000. Owing to the financial depression the state revenues have been reduced \$2,000,000 for the two years. The total appropriations by the last legislature were \$29,146,733.46. Of this charity received \$3,000,000. This condition of affairs will work hardship to the state normal schools. These institutions have received liberal donations from the state the past ten years, and are now asking for appropriations aggregating \$1,100,000. It is the general opinion of the members of the appropriations committee of the senate and house that these schools have received all they are entitled to, and a wide swath will be cut into the respectivo amounts asked for by them.

A Bill to Protect Game.

The house general judiciary committee has brought out the Cotton bill for the protection of game. The measure provides that it shall not be lawful to kill, trap, sell, trade or barter, or expose for sale any wild game or birds, either dead or alive, known under the laws of the state as game, except a license shall have previously been obtained. The license shall be issued during the months of June and July by the county treasurer for one year, and shall only be used in the county in which it is issued during the months of Octobor, November and December. The licenses are divided into three classes: Wholesalers, \$300; retailers, hucksters and peddlers, \$200, and those engaged in hunting game for a living, or employing others to hunt, shall pay a license of \$100. Mentioned for Judgeships.

Although the bill to create the new su perior court has only passed the senate there are already plenty of names men tioned for the five appointments. At first there appeared to be two candidates from Scranton in the persons of Judge Arch-bald and E. N. Willard. The former has, however, declared that he is not a candi date, leaving the field clear for Willard The latter is the law partner of Major Ev erett Warren, the president of the Repub lican State League of Clubs, who is said to be slated for the position of judge advocate general on the governor's staff. Representative O'Malley, of Scranton, has been circulating a petition in the interest of Willard among the senators and repre sentatives from the northeastern part of the state, and nearly all of them have al ready signed it.

Attorney General McCormick is talked of for chief justice of the court, but he is quoted as saying that he does not want to go on the bench. Should he be appointed, George B. 
