CHARM OF THE "AUTOCRAT."

Due to Its Wholesome Spirits and Its Sunny Sugarity.

Then, when Holmes was 48 years old, an age at which most men have stiffened freshness of his talent by writing one of magazine contained the opening pages of the "Autocrat of the Breakfast Table," which every reader followed with delight month after month, until at last the book was completed and pub-lished by itself in the fall of 1858. Since in it is rather as a writer of prose than as a writer of verse that Dr. Holmes has been most highly esteemed,

The "Autocrast of the Breakfast Table is a most original book; not that it is especially original in form, for it is not entirely unlike the Speciator of Addison and Steels, wherein we have a group of characters described, and wherein their sayings and doings are duly recorded. In the American book the group of charsolers meets at the early morning meal, and one of them—the Autociwi himself does most of the ralking. The other figures are lightly sketched-some of them are mersly suggested; and even at the very end there is but the thinnest thread of a story. The real originality of Dr. Holmes's work is in the frank simplicity and sincerity of the Autocrat's talk. He seemed rather to be chatting with himself than conversing with others; and no such talk had yet fallen from any American lips-none so cheerful with humor, so laden with thought, so mellow with knowledge, so ripe with experience. The reader is borne along by the current of it, unresisting, smiling often, laughing sometimes, and absorbing always, even if unconsciously, high and broad thoughts about life.

So ample a store of humor-and of good humor-had Dr. Holmes, so well filled a reservoir of sense and of com-mon sense, that he had an abundance of material for other volumes like the "Autocrat." In 1860 he published the "Professor at the Breakfast Table," and in 1872 the "Post at the Breakfast Ta-Though these two volumes have not all the freshness of the first one, they are inferior only to k; they have the same wholesome spirit, the same sunny sagasity. And these are the qualwhich characterize also his last volume of prose, "Over the Tea-Cups," basued in 1890, when he was 81 years In all these books there is the precious flavor of actual conversation, the table-talk of a broad, liboral, thoughtful man full of fancy and abounding in humor.—Prof. Brander Matthews, in St. Nicholas.

The Red Sea Miracle. Major-General Tulloch has just published in London a report which sub-stantiates the Biblical story that the Jews escaped across the Red Sea dryshod. Major-General Tulloch for the last year has been making governmental surveys for Great Britain in that part of Egypt where the Hebrew chil-dren accomplished their famous journey. In his published statement the Major-General says that in the spring of this year he was engaged in surveying the borders of Lake Menzaleh, on the Red Sea. On one occasion a sudden and violent wind storm arose, the force of which was so prodigious as to carry everything before it, including incidentally the water of the lake. In a few hours the whole body of water had been ab-ducted and nought remained save vessels, mud and sand. The vessels moored in the lake were stranded high and dry. with no water in sight. This is possibly what occurred in the days of Moses. It gives new interest to that famous history wherein is set fort the triumphant flight of the captives dry-shod through the way of the waters, whose returning flood destroyed their oppressors. An examination of the various routes over one or another of which the fleeing Hebrews took their way has demonstrated the fact that in many places they could have managed to cross the sea under favorable natural conditions. As a result of this, Christians now believe that the escape through the waters, was by miraculous intervention from God, working through natural intermediate causes. The skeptle, on the other hand, admits the escape, but denies the providential intervention.

Jewels of Mary Queen of Scots.

When Elizabeth had her heart's de-sire—when Mary's head had fallen on the block—a catalogue of her goods was made at Fotheringay on February 20, 1586-87. We find a "little tablet of gold enameled, containing a picture of the King of Scots." Sir George Clerk, of Peniculk, possesses a similar gold case enameled with very small miniatures of Mary and her son, James VI. Miniatures of the French King and Queen were in a blue enameted book of gold. "A little bird of gold enameted green" is probably the parrot which we meet in an early inventory. There is an enam-eled boy (sometimes called "a Cupid" from happier days), her first husband's gift, with rubies, diamonds and a great pearl. Her first husband's miniature, in an enameled case, was still with her, and a gold and pearl marten, also in the old inventories. A jewel in the form of a tortoise may be the rubled tortue, the gift of David Rizzio. Several trinkets the Queen bequeathed to Bastian Paget, who was married on the night of Darn-ley's slaying. There are altogether about eighty pieces of jewelry and ob-jects of jewelers' art, but of diamonds only two or three, and these small. Such were the jetsam of so many wrecks-wrecks of happiness, power, even of good name and tame, sorrows wherein all was lost save courage and faith.

Carpets. Carpets were used in the East from early times. They are known to have been made in China as early as B. C. 2100, and in India B. C. 1100. They are represented on the Egyptian monuments at a date not later than B. C. 2000. In Rome and Athens they were used on state occasions as luxuries. They were first made in France in 1589. During the times of Henry VIII., and even as late as the days of Elizabeth, the most common carpet in the rooms of the English middle classes was a layer of straw in winter and of mown grass in summer. One of the charges made against Car-dinal Wolsey was that in his state apartments he had fresh supplies of grass or straw every day in the year, renewed at considerable cost. These primitive carpets in the dining rooms of the English soon became very fifthy, as the bones and fragments of food were thrown into the straw, which was also used as a sleeping place by the family dogs.


