ARGUMENT COURT.

Opinions Filed of Interest to Many of Our Readers.

An argument Court was held last Saturday afternoon, at which time the Court filed a number of opinions.

In the case of W. T. Davis, vs. H. W. Bower. A certiorari to Healdy Sult Esq., a Justice of the Peace of Briar-creek township, the Court reversed and set aside the judgment of the Justice, because there was not sufficient evidence heard to warrant a judgment by default, and because the record is defective inasmuch as it did not set forth what hour of the day judgment was entered for the plaintiff.

Franklin Yocum, Guardian vs. William J. Zahner. Rule to show cause why the amendments of Plaintiff's statement prayed for should not be allowed, and why the costs of the former suit should not be directed to be paid by the Plaintiff, now December 21st, 1895 the rule to show cause why the Plaintiff should not pay costs is discharged and the rule to amend is made absolute.

In the estate of Jacob Hinterleiter deceased. This was a rule to show cause by the executors of said Hinterleiter should not pay to William Smith the sum of \$345.66, and why the confirmation absolute of the final account of said executors should not be stricken off and the same be reviewed. It was alleged in the petition that the executors had failed to account for certain notes held by them as executors against themselves as debtors of the estate, and that they had neglected and refused to pay the petitioner his share of said estate arising from the said notes. The executors answered saying that they had filed their final account, in which they had accounted for said notes. That owing to debts there was not sufficient funds to pay the full amount of his share of the said notes. And now December 21st 1895 the rule requiring the executors to make payment of \$345.66 is discharged, and the demurrer to the rule to show cause why the confirmation of the final account of said executors should not be stricken off and said account reviewed, is over-ruled, and the executors of the said Jacob Hinterleiter, deceased, are required to file their answer within thirty days from this date.

Bloomsburg Banking Company, vs. I. W. Willis. This was a case stated in which the Court was requested to determine whether the title to certain stock of the Bloomsburg Carpet Works was in I. W. Willis, and therefore subject to the levy of the plaintiff or in L. E. Waller and the Bloomsburg Artificial Ice Company claimants. The Court said that that question could not be decided as the matter now stood, and suggested that a case

stated should be drawn with L. E. Waller, and Artificial Ice Co. plaintiffs, and the Banking Company defendants.

D. M. Osborne & Co. vs. W. P. Kline. The judgment was opened, and an issue awarded.

In the estate of Samuel Yost deceased, the exceptions were dismissed, and the report of the Auditor was confirmed absolute.

Bloom Poor District vs. C. A. Klein. Petition for a rule to deposit books &c. in the Prothonotary's office. Rule granted on five days notice, returnable December 26, 1895, at 9 o'clock A. M.

In the matter of the assessment of damages in the town of Bloomsburg to Delilah Steiner and J. L. Wolverton, exceptions to the report of the viewers filed, and appeals allowed.

The fourth quarterly conference will be held tomorrow (Saturday) evening, and Love Feast Sunday afternoon at three o'clock.

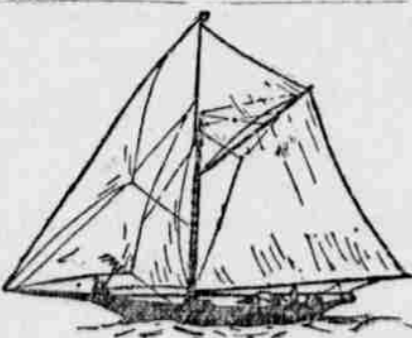

THE CONTRACT AWARDED.

The contract for the new church was awarded by the building committee last Thursday evening to B. W. Jurey of this place for \$39,350. There were five other bidders, but they were all higher than Mr. Jurey excepting one, who estimated on Hummelstown stone, and as the building committee had decided to use the Yorks stone his bid was not taken into consideration. The bid of Mr. Jurey does not include windows, seats, pulpits, light or heating fixtures, but simply the walls, frames, roof, floors &c. The work will be commenced at once and is to be completed by the first of November 1896. As stated above the edifice will be built of what is known as the Yorks stone, with Ohio limestone trimmings. It is expected that when completed the church will cost \$50,000.

Messrs George S. Robbins and C. C. Peacock have been telling some of their friends about the wild turkeys which roam at will through this county, and in order to substantiate their stories, they sent a large one to one of the gentlemen last week. 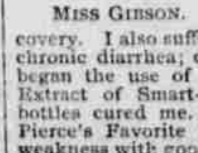

Collecting Old Bills.

In the spring of 1893, Dr. E. Grewer, who represented himself as a noted specialist, opened an office in this city. He hailed from Scranton and only remained here about two months, but during that time he incurred bills aggregating several hundred dollars, which are still unpaid. Yesterday Dr. Grewer's former patients in this vicinity were astonished when a stranger, representing himself as John L. Hoffman, a Scranton attorney, arrived here with \$14,000 worth of judgment notes on which he demanded immediate payment.

Most of these notes ranged in amounts from \$70 to \$90 each, but some of them ran as high as \$200 or \$300. The signatures appear to be genuine, but the alleged makers of them are unanimous in declaring that they were not in their right senses if they signed them. Some further assert that they were not even treated by Dr. Grewer. They are rapidly combining issues and have already engaged counsel to resist payment.

When it became known that Dr. Grewer's attorney was in town, creditors began pouring in on him with bills for advertising, board claims and other accounts that had not been paid. Mr. Hoffman assured them, however, that he was only authorized to make collections. One local attorney says that he holds bills against the specialist for \$400.

The victims of the physician are numerous and embrace a number of well known citizens, many of whom maintain that they never signed any notes to their knowledge. Attorney Hoffman declares that he intends to enter up all notes that are not paid at once.

The above article appeared in the Public Press of Northumberland last week. We also have reason to remember Dr. Grewer. He is indebted to this office for advertising which he has failed to pay. How would it do for his creditors to pool their issues and attach some of this money he alleges is due him?

TIM THE TINKER.

John E. Brennan, the Irish Comedian, has been the recipient of much attention from the Irish national societies around the country. His appearance at the Opera House on next Friday evening will be of interest to the Celtic portion of our citizens, who are fond of a good Irish drama. The play in which he appears is "Tim the Tinker." Chaplain McCabe was greeted with a crowded house last Thursday evening, when he delivered his celebrated lecture, "The Bright Side of Life in Libby Prison." For one hour and a half he held the audience spell-bound. As a lecturer, he has a reputation second to none in the whole country, and he fully sustained it last Thursday evening. Among his audience were some of the best people of the town, who, judging from their comments, felt themselves fully repaid for their attendance.

A Solid Institution.

The Briar-creek Mutual Fire Insurance Company held its annual settlement last Saturday. The affairs of the company were found to be in a flourishing condition. The report shows that there were more policies issued during the past year than during any previous year of the company's existence. This is certainly a good showing, and speaks well for the management of the company.

Mr. John Mowery, one of the most respected citizens of Mifflin township, died at his residence on the 15th of December, leaving to survive him a wife, and three children as follows, George, John M., and Mary I, intermarried with John Learn. He had been a patient sufferer from heart disease for over four years and during all this time he was carefully and lovingly nursed by his aged wife. About one year ago, gangrene attacked his right foot, and since that time his sufferings were almost more than he could bear.

He was aged eighty-four years, two months, and ten days. The funeral services were held on Wednesday December 18, and the interment was in the cemetery at Mifflinville.

Henry Yohé died at the Poor House Monday. We were unable to learn his age. Owing to the condition of his body it was necessary to hold the interment the same evening.

A BEAUTIFUL DISPLAY.

The window of Mercer's drug store is attracting a great deal of attention. The work of the taxidermist is beautifully displayed. The centre piece is a fox, which evidently is being chased by dogs, and he is stopping to rest, alert however, and listening for the dogs. His front foot is raised, and his ears erect. A large Mallard, as well as a wood duck is shown, as are also pheasants, quail, woodcock, rail birds, &c. The whole collection is artistically arranged and is greatly admired.

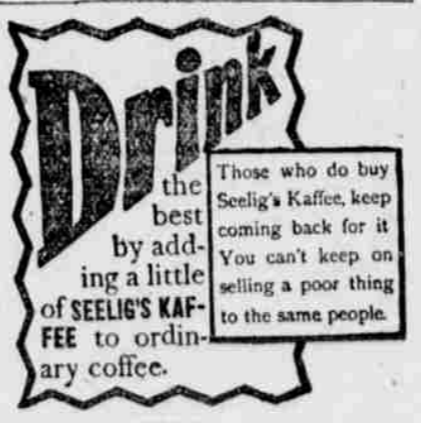
