| There exists in the great ocean be-tween Australla and Now Caledonia a range of mighty submarine mountiaina,whose time-stone teph riso within 300 fathoms of the surface. The discoveryof these peaks, rising sheer 7,500 feet from the bottom of the deepp sea, wasmade by the men who have Just finIshed laying the first mection of thetrana-Pacific cable. sir Audley Coote. who was at the head of the cable exsteamer Alameda from Sydney, New South Wales. He sald: donta has been surveyed by a Bratedonta hat ben surveyed by a Britahand by an Amerlican veasel. Your Albatross went there and did some very ghts expedition and the other missed the strange feature of the ocean that I candescribe. We had antloipated no great diffeulty in laying the cable geetion, and did not fnd any until suddenly the bottom of the ocean began to rise.We were forced to cut the cable there in mid-ocean and to buoy up the ends. Itwas then found that what had bindered us was a range of submarine mountains.$\qquad$ rise in abrupt peaks, and are hard limestone and granite, By careful measure-ment we found that the peaks were more than 7,000 feet on the average, and the highest of thembottom of the ocean. Less than 300 fathoms from the surface of the waterwe found the tops of the highest mountains. The range extends for nearlyseventy-tlve miles-that is, measuring from the extreme northerly to the ex-treme southerly point.
