GENERAL NEWS. In Centre County, 240,000 acres of land will be sold this year for unpaid taxes. Statehood for New Mexico. The House Committee on Territories by a vote of 6 to 4, ordered favorably reported the bill admitting the Territory of New Mexico to the Union as a State. The Arizona bill was laid aside, as there was an objection on the score of lack of population. President Cleveland was 59 years old Wednesday of last week. What an eventful history is comprised within the past quarter of a century of his life. First, sheriff of Erie county, New York; then mayor of Buffalo; next governor of New York, and twice president of the United States, and once defeated. His career and achievements have been indeed marvelous.

Carlisle will not Contest. Secretary Carlisle has written a letter announcing that he will not participate in a contest for the nomination by the Chicago Convention. He says he is much more concerned about the Democratic Party's declaration of principles than in its selection of candidates.

Petticoats Win in Kansas. The enfranchised women of Ellis, Kansas, scored a sweeping victory at the recent municipal election. A complete ticket of women candidates was nominated and all were elected with the exception of Mrs. Clara Sheldon candidate for police judge, who was defeated by a majority of five. Mrs. M. A. Wade, proprietor of a large millinery dry goods store, was elected mayor and Mrs. Viola Gaylord, Mrs. Lillian Hussey, Mrs. Emma Shields, and Mrs. Ella Newcomer were elected members of the council by average majorities of twenty. The women named their ticket "Law and Order" and they propose to enforce the prohibition law to the letter.

Lumbermen along the west branch of the Susquehanna are happy over a bright outlook.

Charged with burning a barn at Jefferson, Morris Bartolet was sent to Schuylkill county jail.

Burglars stole 28 boxes of merchandise from the Reading & Columbia Railroad station at Rothsville.

A locomotive spark ignited the woodland at Hellinsdale, Lebanon County, owned by David Light and Henry, causing a loss of several hundred dollars.

There are over 500 pieces in the \$15,000 set of china used at the White House.

Miss Clara Barton has the honor of being the only woman to whom old Kaiser William ever gave the decoration of the Iron Cross, and she is also the only woman who ever sat in the Swiss National Council.

The wife of William M. McGlann, known as the "Boy Evangelist," of Lowell, Mass., has obtained a divorce.

Walter E. Bidler, aged ten years, residing at Coopers near Corning, N. Y., committed suicide last Sunday night.

Fish pirates are numerous along the Susquehanna near Harrisburg.

Chambersburg's Board of Trade will endeavor to raise \$10,000 as a bait for industries looking for a site to locate.

In Nebraska a spur has been given to tree planting on Arbor days by the offer of social premiums to societies and individuals who should plant the greatest number of trees. As a result over one million trees were set out on the first day of competitive work. Herein is a suggestion for the friends of forestry in this State worth making a note of.

The indications point to the nomination of Senator J. Donald Cameron by the free silver party. If the demands of the advocates for free silver be refused at St. Louis Convention, they will bolt and hold one of their own.

A Large Reservoir to be Built. The Stephen Girard estate is now making arrangements for the erection of a new dam on the lands of the estate. This dam was proposed some time ago, but only recently it was decided to push the work along. The embankment at the breast is to be 1,500 feet long, to cover an area of 63 acres and it will contain 190,000,000 gallons of water. The cost will not be less than \$110,000.

Railroading Difficulties. A 50-mile railroad on the Jamaica Island has been five years building, because of the natural obstacles. The road runs from Kingston over and around the Blue Mountains to Port Antonio, on the east coast, with mountain or morass all the way, says the Railroad Age. It has 27 tunnels, 193 girder bridges, 13 viaducts and 11 tower bridges, and the cost of the work is said to average over \$100,000 per mile.

Masked burglars are terrorizing the citizens of Muncy.

An infernal machine was sent through the Postoffice to Roosevelt, New York's Commissioner of Police. It was carried to police head quarters by a postoffice inspector where it was first well soaked in water, then opened and found to contain an infernal machine, which, had it not been soaked in water, would have exploded upon being opened. Officers have started an investigation.

The next annual Convention of the State Miller's Association will be held at Williamsport.

Rev. Dr. N. C. Schaeffer, state superintendent of Public Schools, has notified the members of the Reading School Board that he will positively not accept the superintendency of the Reading schools. Some months ago Dr. Schaeffer was asked to allow his name to be used as a candidate, being given to understand at the time that the board would probably increase the salary to \$5,000 per year. In declining to become a candidate himself Dr. Schaeffer suggested the names of several educators fitted for the position, should the board desire to make a change.
