



The Act of Assembly provides that said auditors shall be entitled to receive \$1.50 for each and every day actually employed. The salary of the secretary is fixed for the year and he was not entitled to extra compen-sation for attendance at the meeting of the Auditors. It is clear that the directors had no right to pay the Auditors and Secretary the \$250 in excess of the amount allowed by law. Having no right to the money the Poor District is clearly entitled to recover it back from the directors of that year. But the Am-ditors and Secretary of that year. Orders No. 33 and 58, amounting to \$28 were given to pay for the services of two stewards during part of the month of March last The Act of Assembly incorporating Bloom Poor District provides for the appointment of only one steward. It would therefore be litegal to pay for the service of two at the same time. The Directors who appointed and paid for the services of these two stewards should pay in-to the treasury of the poor district \$18, being the amount in excess of the regular salary of the steward of that year. The Supreme Court has de-cided that the overseers of the poor are strictly limited by the various Acts of Assembly re-lating to the maintenance of the poor and ex-cept in rare and special cases they cannot step beyond the letter of these acts. "This is allowed in special emergencies only, as where medical and or other assistance is imperative-ly required before relief can be obtained." Orders 107 and 131, for \$105,17 were given for coal for Bioom Poor District. The actual cost of the coal delivered at Biomsburg was \$2.75 a ton, amounting to \$32.56 but the orders were made up of this amount, and of \$3.66 for est-penses during two trips to Kingston to pur-chase the coal. The bills show that the coal costs \$2.55 a ton. This was a mistake and the Director who furchased the coal should pay \$3.61, being the excess of the actual cost, But he is entitled to pay for his necessary traveling expenses and by presenting an itemized bill the board of Directors should order it pad. .
