Allen Willing to Retire to Make Room for the Silver Champion.

William Vincent Allen, serior senator from Nebraska, appears to be willing to sacrifice himself if William Tennings Bryan expresses a desire to succeed him in the senate. Senator Allen was asked how he regarded the gossip connecting Bryan's name with the Nebraska senatorship. In reply he stated his readiness to give up his seat to the leader of the Democratic party in the recent election.

"It is the privilege of every American citizen to aspire for any or all the offices in the power of his fellow citizens to bestow," said he. "I don't know that Mr. Bryan desires to come to the senate. but if he does, he will have no warmer friend or more stalwart supporter than William Allen, now senator from Nebraska."

This declaration is regarded as indicative of a perfect understanding between the eminent Nebraskans, and that when the time comes to elect a legislature that will choose Allen's successor they will be found acting together, to the end that Nebraska's governor, who is credited with having senatorial aspirations, does not capture the legislature. Allen's readiness to step out of Bryan's way is explained by the supposition that he knows positively that he is not desiring a senatorial seat.
