MCKINLEY TO HIS FRIENDS.

His Address Upon His Departure from Canton to Washington.

Standing upon the platform of the rear coach of his train President-elect McKinley on the morning of his departure for Washington, addressed the thousands who had gathered to wish him farewell in these words:

"My Neighbors and Friends and Fellow Citizens-On the eve of departure to the seat of government, soon to assume the duties of an arduous responsibility, as great as can devolve upon this evidence of your friendship and sympathy, your good will, and, I am sure, the prayers of all the people with whom I have lived so long, and whose confidence and esteem are dearer to me than any other earthly honors.

"To all of us the future is a sealed book; but if I can, by official act, or administration, or utterance in any degree add to the prosperity of our beloved country and the comfort and wellbeing of our splendid citizenship, I will devote the best and most unselfish waters the other day with his flotilla efforts of my life. The assumption of the Chief Magistracy is of such grave importance that partisanship cannot to him were: bilnd the judgment or accept any other consideration but for the public good of all to every party and every section.

"With this thought uppermost in my mind, I reluctantly take leave of my friends and my neighbors, cherishing in my heart the sweetest memories of my old home—my home now, and, I had in mind: The Greece of to-day live. I thank you and bid you all good-by."

THE BIGGEST CAMERA-

Made to Prove the Authenticity of the Fair Signature.

The largest camera in the world has been constructed for the purpose of will in San Francisco, so that Judge and jury may determine by a minute examination of its letters whether or not the decument disposing of millions of dollars is a forgery. The camera has been made by Theodore Kytka, a handwriting expert of San Francisco. He was employed to investigate the pencil will the day on which it was

Believing it to be a forgery, Charles Fair's attorneys, Knight & Haggerty, decided to take every possible means to establish Kytka's theory. So they built this camera.

With it an exact reproduction of any writing can be made, magnified 3,600 times. This means that a letter onetwentieth of an inch in height can be accurately pictured fifteen feet tall. In this way, photographing one minute section after another, the pencil will could be reproduced so that each page would be 3,000 feet wide and 5,100 feet

Mr. Kytka's studio was not large enough for this giant camera. In consequence it has been built in two rooms. The telescopic part, which is made up of twelve sections, or bellows, each supplied with a little side-door entrance, is twenty-five feet long when an adjoining room used as a dark room.—New York Journal.
