C. Frank Barton died at Buffalo, New York, on May 20, 1897, from paralysis. He was born at Espy on February 10, 1844, and was the son of Cyrus and Catharine Barton. His mother, now ninety-five years of age, is still living, though in a very feeble condition. Mr. Barton had an honorable record in the army, having served three years in the 84th Regiment, Pa., Volunteers. He was twice taken prisoner, and was confined in Libby prison. 
