**Per Capita Tax Bill Signed.**

Governor Hastings has approved the bill to authorize and empower the school directors and controllers of the several school districts to levy and collect a per capita tax annually for school purposes. This act gives school directors the authority to levy a per capita tax of "not less than one dollar or more than two dollars for school purposes from each and every male inhabitant of the age of 21 and upwards within their respective districts." This tax shall be levied and collected at the same time and in the same manner as school taxes are now levied and collected by law, and shall be in lieu of the occupation tax for school purposes. This act does in no wise limit or abridge the power of school directors or controllers to levy a tax on real and personal property for school and building purposes.
