Mr. McKinley and his administration have nobody but themselves to blame for many persons regarding their now-you-see-it, now-don't-you-see-it, manipulation of the Union Pacific Railroad question as a thimble-rigging game in which the people have been hoodwinked.

There must be something about the New York City campaign which provokes man to profanity. Secretary Bliss is not ordinarily a profane man, but he has been using ugly cuss words in public to emphasize his denial of the charge that funds of the Republican National Committee, of which he is Treasurer, were being used in behalf of Gen. Tracy, the Platt-McKinley candidate for Mayor of greater New York.

The screws have never been turned upon Ohio republicans employed in the government departments harder than during the present week. Many of them having pleaded poverty as an excuse for not going home to vote, Boss Hanna sent a big batch of railroad tickets—something like 500—from Washington to Columbus, Ohio, and return, to his Washington agent, and these tickets have been placed in the hands of those Ohio republicans who had claimed to be too poor to buy their own railroad tickets, and each of them has been informed that by calling at the Hanna headquarters in Columbus in person he can secure round-trip free transportation from that city to his voting place in the State.

'Squire Donohue's Unique Marriage Certificate Aids a Widow.

George Bounds and Mary Rogers were married in Wilkesbarre in 1884 by Squire Donohue. The Squire made a memorandum of the marriage in the lining of his high silk hat. The news of Cleveland's election came on the night of the marriage, and in the public demonstration that followed Donohue's hat was wrecked. It was taken home and laid on a shelf.

Bounds and his wife went West, where the husband was employed on a railroad as brakeman. A year ago he was killed in Colorado. He was a member of the Railway Brotherhood. The latter would pay no insurance to the widow until she furnished a marriage certificate. This she could not do.

She wrote to Donohue, but he had forgotten all about the marriage. Then the widow came on to Wilkesbarre, but the Justice could not identify her.

Reading, Pa., Oct. 28.—Clifton S. Knorr, whose confession caused such a sensation in the Winterstein-Waller dynamite case at Bloomsburg, upon returning from the latter place to Reading, in company with Sallie Gast, said to Chief Albrecht:

"I have got a job in Philadelphia and have been working for the past two weeks, and am going to settle down for good." He added that hereafter he would steer clear of Reading and Bloomsburg; that he was glad the whole case had been dropped, as he did not like the notoriety and had been treated badly. He declared that he admitted that he had been guilty of a lot of things that he should not have done, but that if convicted and sentenced he would have taken his medicine like a man.

The Man Who Swindled Undertaker Calvert Still at Work. A few days ago a man stepped into the furniture and undertaking establishment of B. Merz, in Morris, Tioga county, and said he wanted to purchase a burial casket for his wife's body and a set of chairs. After agreeing upon the price, he offered a check on the First National Bank of Wellsboro for \$6.75 more than the casket and chairs came to and obtained that amount in change.

As the man did not return, Mr. Merz began to make some inquiries, and he found that he had been sadly mistaken about the identity of his customer, whom he thought he knew when he sold the burial casket. Then he telephoned to the bank and found that the check was entirely worthless, the signer having no money on deposit and no such person being known by the officers.

MAY GO FREE.

Luetgert who has been on trial at Chicago for the murder of his wife, and in which case the jury could not agree, will from present indications be given his freedom shortly. In speaking of a new trial, Judge Tutthill, who tried the case said: "I fancy Luetgert will never again be tried. I hardly think that the prosecution can find twelve men who have not already tried the accused in their own minds and either acquitted or convicted him."

Several museums are very anxious to exhibit Luetgert and are offering to go his bail in order to get him. In spite of the serious charge against him and after nine of the twelve jurors were of the opinion that he killed his wife, Luetgert has received many letters from women offering themselves in marriage.
