

Dingley's January Deficit.

There is not much encouragemen for Dingley in the Treasury statement for January. This was the month for paying the quarterly interest on Government bonds and something of a deficit was to be expected. But the actual excess of expenditures over receipts, after deducting the amounts received from the purchasers of the Union Pacific railroad, was \$7,901,-484, or nearly \$8,000,000. The receipts from all sources were \$28,795,225, of which not quite half, or 795,225, which more quite man, of fit,269,492, was derived from customs. This was a gain of about \$3,000,000, as compared with January of last year, for which the revival of general business is responsible. It is fortunate for Dingley and the Administration that the internal revenue receipts are increasing, showing a gain of over \$1,300,000 in January. It has been the expectation of the Republican statisticians that there would be a small deficit in January, but a surplus in both February and March, so that the present quarter would show a net surplus. But a deficit of \$0,000,000 surplus. But a deficit of \$9,000,000 to start with makes this result improbable. The Dingley law went into effect July 24th. The deficit for the present fiscal year, July 1st, is now \$51,901,823. Two murderers are now awaiting the day set for their hanging, Frank Jongrass, of Lawrence, who murdered his sweetheart and will be hanged Feb. 24, and Fig. Hill, of Allegheny, whose case is the supreme court.
