

SHARKEY WHIPS M'COY.

Brute Strength Triumphs Over Science in the Prize Ring.

New York, Jan. 11.—At the Lenox Athletic Club last night, before a howling mob that completely filled the arena, Sharkey, the sailor, knocked out Kid McCoy.

An old, old timer, who had gone through the talk of a thousand nistic festivals, said it was numerous degrees colder than Corbett's backers were at Coney City in the March when Sullivan's conqueror passed the heavy-weight championship up to Fitzsimmons.

First Round.—They advance to the center and shake hands. McCoy circled around Sharkey, led left for the body and put the right under the chin. They clinched and broke clean. McCoy kept his feet going and got the right to Sharkey's face. A vicious left swing by Sharkey was cleverly ducked. The Kid put the left to Tom's ribs and put a hot right hander to the face. Sharkey tried a right swing without avail. Both were smiling as the round closed.

Second Round.—McCoy immediately put his feet to work and got his left to the face in easy fashion, but without strength. Sharkey forced the Kid to the ropes and then tried to rough him to the ground, but without harm. Sharkey tried with the left for a swing to the head, but McCoy side stepped and then jabbed left to the wind. Another tremendous swing by Sharkey's left was finely ducked and then the Kid out the left into Sharkey's neck. There was evidence of attempted roughing on the part of the ex-sailor as the round closed.

Third Round.—The Kid opened the round with a solid left on the eye. Sharkey tried a swing and uppercut without reaching the spot intended and the Kid lost his feet going and got into close quarters, where he worked on the stomach. Sharkey missed a left swing, and the Kid got his left to the chest with good effect. Sharkey got in a left swing lightly under the chin. McCoy knocked Sharkey down twice and kept up the same furious gait when the mariner came to his feet, having him thoroughly at sea when time was called at the end of the round.

Fourth Round.—A feint with the right on McCoy's part was mimicked ludicrously by the sailor. The Kid landed left and right on the nose. Sharkey clinched. Sharkey missed left hook, and the Kid lost no time in returning with a straight left.

Fifth Round.—Sharkey started to rough it, missed with both hands, and when the Kid ducked, the sailor dove into the ropes. The Kid landed the left full on the neck. Again he put it home fair and blocked the sailor's right counter. The crowd blessed as Sharkey continued to rough matters.

Sixth Round.—The Kid began with putting the left to Sharkey's forehead. Sharkey rushed and got home a blow with the right under the Kid's heart, but without doing apparent harm. The round ended with Sharkey blowing like a whale and the Kid as composed as at the start.

Seventh Round.—The Kid again jabbed the left to the eye. McCoy uppercut Sharkey.

Eighth Round.—Sharkey ran into a left lead. When McCoy stood Sharkey off the sailor addressed the crowd with "He's tired." Sharkey sent in two low blows, taking the Kid clean below the belt. The Kid fell in heap, but got up and continued with speed. Sharkey again began to rough and landed left and right to the head.

Ninth Round.—Sharkey landed two lefts on the ear in quick succession. Sharkey fouled repeatedly.

Tenth and last Round.—Sharkey came up still on the aggressive. McCoy led to the face, and Sharkey, with one hand free, uppercut him. The referee did not notice the blow. McCoy backed away and then jumped in with a vicious left on Sharkey's bad eye, the right one. Sharkey bored McCoy going away, but before he could get out of distance Sharkey flashed a left hook to the jaw. The Kid went down against the ropes on the east side of the ring. Before he had staggered to his feet he was counted out, but Sharkey did not know this, and rushing in before the referee could stop him again fouled his man. Then the referee sent Sharkey to his corner, and McCoy, who was muggy, slowly rose and staggered to his corner, soundly and decisively beaten. Time of round, one minute and thirteen seconds.

Ambassador to Russia. Washington, D. C., Jan. 11.—The president has sent these nominations to the Senate: Charles M. Tower of Pennsylvania now minister to Austria-Hungary, to be ambassador to Russia. Addison C. Harris of Indiana to be minister to Austria-Hungary.

Mr. Addison C. Harris, who has been nominated as minister to Austria-Hungary, to succeed Mr. Tower, is a well known lawyer of Indianapolis and a life long friend of Senator Fairbanks.

Mr. Place Must Die. Albany, N. Y., Jan. 11.—The court of appeals have affirmed the judgment of conviction in the case of the people vs. Place.

In this case Martha Place was convicted of having smothered her step-daughter, Ida Place, on February 7 last in Brooklyn.

FINED THE FATHER. First Prosecution at Reading Under the Compulsory School Law.

The first case under the compulsory school law in Reading was decided by Alderman Yarnel. It was against Edward C. Hammer, a clerk, who was charged with keeping his two children, aged 8 and 11 years, out of school. The fathers defence was that the children are in delicate health.

The Alderman decided to fine the father \$2 for each child and also imposed the costs, amounting to \$4.99 in each case. Upon being informed of the decision Attorney Flood announced his determination of taking an appeal to court, giving as one of the reasons that the law under which the action was brought is unconstitutional.

Knows Keely's Secret.

Joseph Repetti, an expert Vineland machinist and inventor, claims to be the only living man in possession of the Keely motor secret. The secret, he says, did not die with Keely. Repetti believes himself to be the only person to whom Keely ever showed his complete motor, and as he took an oath never to divulge the secret, he has not yet convinced himself that his obligation was dissolved through Mr. Keely's death.

Repetti is a Mason, of excellent standing in the local lodge, and a highly respected citizen, whose varacity and capabilities are well known in Vineland. Repetti says he can build another motor just like Keely's, which the company has, since the originators death, placed in the hands of T. B. Kinrade, a Boston scientist, to work out.
