The McEnery Resolution Passes The Senate, 26 to 22.

SENATOR HOAR VOTES "NO"

Senator Stewart Says We Should Hold the Philippines and Render the United States Independent in Securing Tropical Products and Save \$250,000,000.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 15.—In accordance with agreement the Senate met at 11 o'clock a. m. yesterday. There were only nine senators present, and the absence of the chaplain made it necessary to proceed without formal prayer. By the time the reading of the journal had been concluded the original number present had been doubled, and Mr. Stewart took the floor to make a speech in opposition to the McEnery resolution declaratory of the policy of this country toward the inhabitants of the Philippines.

The resolution introduced by Senator McEnery on Monday, February 6, the day on which the peace treaty was ratified, declares that "by the ratification of the peace treaty it is not intended to incorporate the inhabitants of the Philippine Islands into United States citizenship, nor to annex permanently the islands as part of the territory of the United States, but to establish a government suitable to the wants and conditions of the inhabitants to prepare them for local self-government, and in due time to make such disposition of the islands as will best promote the interests of the United States and of the inhabitants."

He expressed the opinion that whatever the United States might do it would not follow the policy indicated by the resolution. This country was under no obligation to go to the expense of establishing a government for the islands; the United States was not in the business of capturing countries, educating their people and then selling them.

On the contrary, he thought we should hold the Philippines, and thus render the United States independent of other countries in the production of tropical products, which must otherwise be a source of great expense. Now it costs \$250,000,000 to secure these products, and why should we not hold those islands and produce our own fruits and sugars?

Mr. Lindsay said the time was inauspicious to adopt resolutions bearing upon the subject of the government of the Philippines, but said if any expression was to be given it should be unmistakable in terms.

Mr. Lindsay offered a substitute reciting that the acquisition of territory carried with it no constitutional obligation to admit it to the Union as states. Mr. Lindsay gave notice that he would ask the Senate to vote upon his resolution as soon as the Senate had acted on the McEnery resolution.

Mr. Bacon spoke in opposition to the McEnery resolution.

Mr. Hoar of Massachusetts was opposed to the McEnery resolution. It was held, an infamous declaration—a declaration simply that the Louisiana sugar planters should never be afraid of the competition of the Philippine islands. Mr. Hoar made a defense of Aguinaldo.

"I do not see," said Mr. Hoar, with feeling, "how any American heart, not of tone, could fail to recognize the force of his appeal."

Mr. Mason said that he voted for the treaty with the understanding that there should be no further war in the Philippines.

The Senate passed the McEnery resolution 26 to 22.

President's Trip.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 15.—It was said at the White House that the storm probably would not interfere with the president's trip to Boston as guest of the Home Market Club, at its banquet next Thursday.

The president sent a check for \$100 to one of the relief organizations; the British members of the high joint commission contributed liberally, and the husband of Julia Arthur, the actress, who is playing here, sent a check for \$1,000 for relief of the poor.

Uniontown, Pa., Feb. 15.—Karl Norcross, a prominent young man of this place, was arrested last night on a charge of hiring men to poison his little brother, Allen, 16 years old, who lives with his uncle, Mr. Jarrett, at West Newton.

A New Library For the State College.

Mr. Carnegie's offer to give \$100,000.00 for the erection of a Library Building for the use of The Pennsylvania State College has attracted very wide and favorable comment. The only condition attached to his offer is that the State shall provide a sufficient sum for its annual maintenance. Mr. Carnegie says:

"The College is doing such great work for the State that I do not think any individual should contribute money to it for additional buildings, unless the State agrees to maintain them. It is a duty which the State owes to its bright young men who attend the College of their own State instead of going to other States for their education. Born Pennsylvanians, they grow up Pennsylvanians."

In this connection Pennsylvanians will be especially interested to note:—FIRST. That the State of Pennsylvania, in 1863, accepted a grant of lands from the United States in consideration of which it bound itself by public covenant to maintain its State College.

SECOND. That every other State in the Union accepted a similar grant on the same conditions.

THIRD. That thirty-five of these States make larger appropriations for the maintenance of their State College, in proportion to the wealth of the State, than Pennsylvania does.

FOURTH. That The Pennsylvania State College is the only institution in the State entitled to such support, and is, in no sense, a local institution, 57 counties out of the 67 being this year represented among its students, and it has a reputation for thoroughness of work second to none in the country.

It is doubtless known to our readers that the law of Congress relating to the State College forbids the use of any portion of the United States funds for the erection or maintenance of buildings which, accordingly, must be provided by the State. Mr. Carnegie's proposed gift is therefore a direct contribution to the State of Pennsylvania for the benefit of the one College which the State has pledged itself to maintain.
