## American Oyster Trade.

American oysters rank among the best in the world, and the export list is growing all the time. England takes about 3000 barrels a week all the year round. Gone, says the New York Sun are the days of the old Saddle Rocks, which no man could place entire in his mouth, which for frying were the will be made to his being sworn in as Elysium of the Philadelphia chef. In the old days there were only three centers for oysters-Baltimore, New York and New Haven. The best oysters came from Blue Point, Oak Haven, Buzzard's Bay (deep water), Lynn Haven, (Chesapeake), Shrewsbury, Mill Pond, Rockaway, Maurice River Cove (mouth of Delaware), Great South and Lower Bay. Experts in the business say that the finest oysters obtainable are in the first weeks of May, as then the fat, luscious Virginia oysters come North to be planted. Oysters are placed in spawn in "spat beds" along the deeper water shores of bays and estuaries. Each is capable of producing 1,000,000 eggs.
