

PACK TRAIN TAKEN.

Philippine Ambush Americans and Sisco Goods.

MANILA, Jan. 22.—The escort of 50 men of Company C, Thirtieth Infantry, Lieutenant Halston commanding, which was ambushed near Lipa, as already cabled, consisted of 50 convalescents from the hospital who were going to rejoin the regiment. The insurgents hid in the bushes along the road and opened fire upon the pack train from three sides. The Americans, in addition to their casualties, were compelled to abandon the train, which consisted of 22 horses. The latter, with their packs, all fell into the hands of the insurgents, who pursued the retreating escort for three miles along the road until the Americans were reformed. Mail advices from Negros bring particulars of the uprising last month in the southern part of the island in which Lieutenant A. C. Ledyard, Sixth Infantry, was killed. Instead of being an important revolt of native police, as was at first reported, it appears to have been an attempt to overthrow the American authority. The movement was started by the chief officials of the autonomous government, the men who were elected and inaugurated with so much ceremony last November. Eleven of these officials, including the president and several councilors, were lodged in jail on the charge of plotting treason. Several secured their release under heavy bonds, but others remain in prison. Major Johnson, with two companies of the Forty-sixth regiment, and Major Muir, with three companies of the Thirty-eighth, have defeated 800 rebels at Taal, in the southern province of Batangas. They captured three cannon and many other arms. The American loss was two men wounded. The gunboat Marietta co-operated with the troops.

TOO MUCH WHISKY.

An Exorbitant Demand For Fire-water at Soldiers' Home.

ALBANY, Jan. 24.—State Comptroller William J. Morgan has been giving special attention lately to the very large amount of liquor consumed in the hospital at the Soldiers' home at Bath. It appears that from three to six times as much liquor was being consumed in the hospital at Bath as in the hospitals connected with other soldiers' and sailors' homes throughout the country. Formerly three barrels a month were called for, and during five months of the past year two barrels were allowed. The average for patients per month in the four large soldiers' homes has been: Bath, 65 gallon; Dayton, 18 gallon; Milwaukee, 25 gallon; and Hampton, 10 gallon. It will be seen from this that the amount consumed at Bath is over six times as much as at the home at Dayton, the largest soldiers' home in the country. In addition to this amount large quantities of brandy, sherry, port and white wines were used.

PROFESSOR HAZEN DEAD.

Never Regained Consciousness After His Fall From Bicycle.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—Henry A. Hazen, one of the chief forecasters of the weather bureau, died here last night as the result of injuries received by a bicycle collision with a negro pedestrian. His skull was badly fractured, and he continued unconscious up to the time of his death. Professor Hazen was well known among meteorologists and scientific men. He was born in India 50 years ago, his father being a missionary. He was graduated from Dartmouth college and then was connected with the scientific department of Yale university for nine years. He joined the United States signal service, now the weather bureau, in 1881. He was single and lived with a sister and two nephews. Another sister is a missionary.

DEATH OF RUSKIN.

Famous Art Critic Passes Away at a Ripe Age.

LONDON, Jan. 22.—John Ruskin died here of influenza, aged 81 years. The remains of Mr. John Ruskin, in accordance with a wish he expressed years ago, will be interred in Coniston churchyard. The funeral will take place on Thursday.

Ruskin Will Not Rest in the Abbey.

LONDON, Jan. 24.—The dean of Westminster has offered a grave in Westminster abbey for the remains of John Ruskin. This honor, however, has been declined by Mr. Ruskin's relatives, who say in their reply to Dr. Bradley that it was the professor's own wish to sleep in Coniston churchyard, where his remains will be interred on Thursday. The dean and chapter of Westminster abbey are pressing the relatives to reconsider their decision. It is hoped that Mrs. Severn will yet consent to an interment in the abbey. The memorial presented to the dean in favor of interment here was very largely signed by eminent persons.

Clark Case Hints.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—The senate committee on privileges and elections has adjourned over until Monday in its investigation of the charges against Senator Clark of Montana. Witnesses for the prosecution were absent, and Senator Faulkner, for the defense, indicated a desire that none of those who are to be called as witnesses on that side should testify until the prosecution had completed its case.

A Conference About Acre.

RIO JANEIRO, Jan. 24.—Dr. Salinas Vega, the Bolivian minister, had a conference with President Campos Salles and the foreign minister, Dr. de Magalhães, on the question of Acre, and it was resolved to send the gunboat Jutahy to Puerto Alonso with instructions to re-establish the Bolivian custom house and the Brazilian consulate and to bring Galvez, the deposed dictator, prisoner to Manaus.

A Madman's Crime.

NORTH BROOKFIELD, Mass., Jan. 20.—Martin Bergen, one of the best known ball players in the country and one of the Boston club's catchers last season, killed his wife and two children with an ax, then cut his own throat with a razor at his home in the eastern portion of North Brookfield yesterday morning.

For the St. Louis World's Fair. ST. LOUIS, Jan. 23.—The Pennsylvania railroad system has subscribed \$50,000 toward the \$5,000,000 subscription fund being raised for the St. Louis world's fair to be held in 1903 to commemorate the Louisiana purchase centennial. Other subscriptions of equal or greater amounts are promised.
