There is open revolt in the republican ranks against a part of the McKinley programme. Senator Platt, of Conn., has given notice of his intention to offer amendments to the administration bill providing governments for Hawaii and Porto Rico.

The State Game Commission at Harrisburg has heard from all parts of the State concerning the game season, and is informed there were more deer killed legally this year than in many years, and, so stringent has been the enforcement of the deer laws, that there are many deer yet in the woods, and they are consequently multiplying.

Not Held Responsible.

The Ohio supreme court has handed down a decision to the effect that railroads are not liable for fire damages resulting from locomotive sparks, provided it can be established that due care has been exercised on the railroad in the handling of the engine.

Lands the State Owns. Forestry Commission Discusses Acquire to be Set aside as Public Parks.

At a fully attended meeting of the forestry commission at Harrisburg Simon P. Woyveton and Monroe H. Kulp represented a number of persons who have lands to sell to the State for forest reservations.

Governor Stone, at the meeting, tersely stated that these reservations are to be the parks and the outing grounds of the people forever.
