# Many Deer Killed.

The State Game Commission at Harrisburg has heard from all parts of the State concerning the game season, and is informed there were more deer killed legally this year than in many years, and, so stringent has been the enforcement of the deer laws, that there are many deer yet in the woods, and they are consequently multiplying. Attorney General Elkin has given the Game Commission an opinion on the law, in which he says that all special acts conflicting with the general game act have been repealed, and the Pike county people will have to quit killing deer out of season. The Commission has been encouraging the establishing of local Game Commissions, and proposes to hold meetings all over the State.

# Not Held Kesponsible-

The Ohio supreme court has handed down a decision to the effect that railroads are not liable for fire damages resulting from locomotive sparks, provided it can be established that due care has been exercised on the railroad in the handling of the engine. Heretofore it has been necessary tor the railroads to prove that a fire occurring within a quarter of a mile of a railroad was not caused by locomotive sparks. A stack of hay or grain lc cated anywhere near a railroad might be set on fire by a tramp, but the railroad would have to pay for it.

Lands the State Owns.

Forestry Commission Discusses Acreage to be Set aside as Public Parks.

At a fully attended meeting of the forestry commission at Harrisburg Simon P. Wolverton and Monroe H. Kulp represented a number of persons who have lands to sell to the State for forest reservations. Maps were submitted explaining the location of the property and its relations to the water sheds of the State. A full discussion was had with regard to their desirability. It was shown that the lands that have passed into the possession of the State about 20,000 acres are on the headwaters of the Delaware. The remainder purchased, about 39 .-000 acres, are on the Susquehanna watershed There are also in sight now, with the prospect of a speedy purchase, about 40,000 acres.
