

CONGRESSMAN HARMER DEAD

Well Known as the "Father of the House"—Honored Career Closed. PHILADELPHIA, March 7.—Congressman Alfred C. Harmer of the Fifth Pennsylvania district and the "father of the house" died last night at his home in Germantown, a suburb of this city. Mr. Harmer had been ill since last November when he was stricken with a severe attack of kidney trouble. He recovered sufficiently to attend the opening of congress in December, but later was again confined to his bed. A few days ago he suffered a relapse and steadily failed until last evening, when he died surrounded by his wife, three sons and two daughters.

Alfred C. Harmer was born in Germantown on Aug. 8, 1825. He was educated in the public schools and in the Germantown academy. He began his public career in 1854, when he was elected to city council for four years. In 1859 he was elected recorder of deeds for this city for three years. He was elected to congress in 1870 and re-elected to every subsequent congress with the exception of the Forty-fourth. The one break in his long congressional career was due to a three-cornered fight. Neither he nor his Republican opponent would yield, and John Robbins, a Democrat, slipped it and captured the prize by about 1,000 plurality. Mr. Harmer was elected by a substantial majority in 1876 and since had had no difficulty in retaining his seat. His majority almost constantly increased, he being returned to the present congress with 30,000 majority.

Although not prominent for his ability as a speaker, Mr. Harmer had been a tireless worker in the committees and throughout his long career as a congressman attended closely to the duties of his office. Congressman Harmer was engaged in many business enterprises in the course of his life.

CUBANS PEACEABLE

No Truth in the Wild Stories of an Uprising.

HAVANA, March 7.—The frequent rumors cabled from the United States regarding possible uprisings in Cuba in the early future are causing the press of the island to ask who is responsible for these wonderful stories. The newspapers without exception declare that the people of Cuba never felt less like rising than they do at present. Even the native politicians in order to get more United States troops into Cuba. The Patria says: "The recent reports from Washington to the effect that an uprising is imminent in Cuba we can only regard with wonder and ridicule. Cubans are not like the athletic people of Kentucky, who shoot at the smallest provocation. Nor is Cuba yet convinced that the joint resolution of congress is a dead letter."

PORTO RICAN RELIEF

President's Recommendation Quickly Acted Upon.

WASHINGTON, March 3.—Within two hours after a special message from the president, recommending the immediate passage of a bill to place in his hands all the moneys collected upon Porto Rican goods since the Spanish evacuation of the island to be used for the relief of the Porto Ricans, had been read to the house yesterday the house had passed and sent to the senate a bill to carry out the recommendation. The message came like a bolt of a clear sky to the minority. They were at first inclined to hail it with delight as a proof of the majority for the passage of the Porto Rican tariff bill on Wednesday. The Republican leaders, however, had a bill ready to carry the president's recommendations into effect. Mr. Cannon asked immediate consideration for the bill, and this was given. It was only when the debate opened, it having been agreed that 20 minutes should be allowed on a side, that under the lead of Mr. Bailey of Texas, the Democrats began lining up against the bill because it placed no limitation upon the president's discretion in the use of the money. The bill was passed by a vote of 162 to 107. 13 Democrats, two Populists and two Silver Republicans voting with the Republicans in the affirmative.

Reconnoissance at Coloberg.

COLEBERG, Cape Colony, March 5.—A reconnoissance with two troops of Australians and two guns found the wagon bridge over the Orange river intact. Fifty Boers on the other side were taken by surprise, and the British galloped to their laager, some miles on the Free State side. Price's command has moved seven miles north of Coloberg.

Miss Terry Ill.

TORONTO, March 7.—Miss Ellen Terry, who was to have taken part in Irving's production of the Grand Opera House here this week, is confined to her room in the Queen's hotel, suffering from pleurisy. She will consequently be unable to appear at any of the performances.

More Soldier Dead at Arlington.

WASHINGTON, March 7.—Sixty-six of the 99 soldier dead brought home from China on the transport McClellan have arrived here from New York and were interred at the Arlington cemetery today with appropriate religious and military ceremonies.

Japanese Crown Prince Betrothed.

BERLIN, March 7.—Diplomatic circles here have received information that the Japanese crown prince, Yoshihito Harunomiya, is betrothed to Princess Sada of the Japanese house Kujō.

A Present to Lillokualani.

WASHINGTON, March 7.—Senator Hoar has given notice of an amendment he will offer to the diplomatic appropriation bill providing for the payment of \$250,000 to Lillokualani, late queen of the Hawaiian Islands.
