

CONDENSED DISPATCHES.

Notable Events of the Week Briefly and tersely told.

The heat caused one death and four others in Chicago.

A heavy snowstorm was reported from Leipzig and Chemnitz, Germany.

The Rochester school bill, which was fraudulently amended, was declared null.

The Methodist general conference at Chicago declared in favor of a negro bishop.

Two firemen at Somerville, N. J., were badly burned by gasoline from an exploded tank.

Terrible distress was reported in the famine districts of India despite the lavish distribution of funds.

A small fire which broke out in the Chateau d'Eau caused intense excitement on the Paris exposition grounds.

Argument in the franchise tax case before the appellate division of the supreme court was adjourned to the June term.

Tuesday, May 15. The University of Cambridge conferred the degree of doctor of laws on the king of Sweden and Norway.

Philadelphia Republicans announced that they had raised the \$100,000 pledged for the national convention.

Secretary Chamberlain introduced in the house of commons a bill to make Australia a federal commonwealth.

Hot weather prevailed in New York and vicinity, the thermometer in some cases registering as high as 94 degrees.

Rev. E. E. Patton made a sensational attack on churches and preachers from the stage of Burt's Opera House at Toledo.

A suit against the sugar trust at Trenton charged it with restraining trade illegally in an attempt to force the Arlucky company to combine with it.

Charles H. Cole, former president of the Globe National bank of Boston, was sentenced to eight years in jail for misappropriation of funds.

Monday, May 14. A coal mine explosion at Toms Creek, Va., killed six men.

Thirty-two schooners returning to Victoria, B. C., have secured 15,000 seal-skins.

Three shipments of arms from Germany were reported at Hongkong for the Filipino junta.

A fire in Fukin, Japan, has destroyed 1,600 houses and many temples at an estimated loss of \$2,500,000.

Several American Roman Catholic prelates are in Rome in connection with the creation of a second American cardinal.

Large gold shipments from the United States and from Russia have eased the stringency in the London money market.

The American pavilion at the Paris exposition was formally turned over to the exposition authorities, great throngs of Americans witnessing the ceremonies.

Saturday, May 12. The third drawing room of the season was held by the queen at Buckingham palace.

The Tennessee Democrats renominated Governor McMillin and declared for Bryan and the Chicago platform.

Major General Brooke relieved General Merritt at Governor's island, in charge of the department of the east.

It is reported at Constantinople that the Turkish minister in Washington has given the American government assurances of the settlement of its claims.

A threatening dispatch to the empress dowager of China from the Poh Wong Wei in America was stopped by the British embassy, in whose care it was sent.

Friday, May 11. Much damage by frosts was reported. The eruption of Vesuvius is reported practically over.

The queen arrived in London to attend today's drawing room.

Citizens of Rochester will give General Otis a banquet on his return home.

Advances have been made in trans-Pacific passenger rates to take effect June 15.

The British colonial office has no confirmation of the reported fall of Ku mass.

Francesco Abbatta was hanged at Camden, N. J., for the murder of Gebard de Feo.

Three prisoners escaped from the New York state reformatory at Elmira Wednesday night.

It is estimated that the cotton crop of the United States will be greater than last year by 10 per cent.

A cabinet crisis is expected to follow the demonstrations against the Spanish government's taxation schemes.

Two hundred and seventy-five Lehigh Valley car repairers struck at Buffalo in sympathy with the men already out.

The temperature in New York city Wednesday was 5 degrees lower than any previous record made for the same date in May.

Thursday, May 10. Lightning set fire to a loaded trolley car on the Passaic-Hoboken line.
