

CONDENSED DISPATCHES.

Notable Events of the Week Briefly and tersely told.

The Klondike output is estimated at \$30,000,000. Rev. Dr. A. J. F. Behrens of Brooklyn died of Bright's disease. One hundred and forty lives were lost in the wreck of the Chinese steamer Keung Fut.

The village of Point Claire, 16 miles from Montreal, was almost entirely destroyed by fire. Ex-Secretary Sherman will leave Washington Friday for Mansfield, O., to spend the summer.

A movement has been started in the Western Passenger association to give civil war veterans, Union and Confederate, half fare rates.

President McKinley will appear on horseback at the Grand Army encampment in Chicago in August.

The French parliament reassembled, and the government was interpellated on its policy in the chamber of deputies.

Captain Robley D. Evans, U. S. N., has arrived at the Army and Navy hospital at Hot Springs, Ark., suffering from a severe case of rheumatism.

Tuesday, May 22. A "holy war" is reported to have been proclaimed in Algeria and Morocco.

The Methodist conference failed to elect on the sixteenth ballot for bishop. Three persons were injured in a riot in connection with the St. Louis street car strike.

The Chinese authorities have decided to take vigorous measures to suppress the "Boxers."

Severe drought was reported in the state of Ceara, Brazil. No rain has fallen for 14 weeks.

The Connecticut river was 14.5 feet above the low water mark and overflowed in many places.

An embassy has left Abyssinia on its way to Paris. King Menelik, who was expected, was not able to come.

At Paulding, O., Simon W. Cramer, an ex-convict, accidentally shot and killed his wife while hunting rats.

Advices received at Victoria, B. C., state that the ice has broken up on the Yukon and that steamers are running.

A. G. Safford, a well known Washington attorney, lies speechless in Boise City as the result of a stroke of brain paralysis.

Immense icebergs in Bering sea prevented the steamer Alpha, which sailed from Vancouver April 6, from landing at Nome.

Eight hundred employees of Dunn & McCarthy's shoe factory at Syracuse demanded higher wages, and the shops were closed indefinitely.

Monday, May 21. King Leopold of Belgium has arrived in England on a visit.

A statue of Gladstone has been unveiled in the central hall of the house of commons.

William H. Hunt of Montana has been selected to be secretary of state for the island of Porto Rico.

French exposition authorities have granted the request of American athletes and will not hold games on Sunday.

Catharine Martin, in Worcester, Mass., confessed to having set fires in hotels and boarding houses in many cities.

Daniel Sherwood of Suffern, N. Y., has just received \$50 for nine pearls which he found in the stomach of a partridge.

Saturday, May 10. The grand vizier of Morocco died last Sunday.

The Brazos and Colorado rivers were reported rising again.

A buffalo calf was born in the Central park menagerie in New York city.

Cases of the plague were reported from almost every seaport in Australia.

The king of Italy has signed a decree dissolving the chamber of deputies.

Two were killed and seven injured, three fatally, by the explosion of a locomotive's boiler at Hobbs, Ills.

Forty-five famine camps in one division in India have been attacked by cholera, causing an appalling loss of life.

Governor Roosevelt approved the exemption of the state transfer tax appraisers from civil service examinations.

The Russian minister informed the Korean government that Masamupo would be the winter headquarters of the czar's fleet.

The striking St. Louis street car employees have called on local labor unions to aid them by ordering a general sympathetic strike.

Friday, May 18. The Pennsylvania railroad will establish a new branch office in New York.

The boiler of a Russian torpedo boat exploded at Cronstadt, killing six persons.

The race question was discussed at the southern industrial convention at Chattanooga.

The British steamer Samantha was wrecked on the Nova Scotia coast. The crew was saved.

The son of the Duke and Duchess of York was christened Henry William Frederick Albert.

A relief force has been sent from the British Gold Coast to Kumassi, which is besieged by the Ashantis.

Two hundred students from the University of Nebraska, on a rampage, assaulted the chief of police of Lincoln.

The California supreme court has declared the bonds of railways and other quasi public corporations nonassessable for taxation purposes.

An unknown man shot 12 of the passengers and crew of the steamer Prins Carl, plying between Koping and Stockholm, killing six, and escaped.

Thursday, May 17. Admiral Dewey returned to Washington from his western trip.

Nearly all St. Louis street car lines began operations with nonunion men.

Two persons were killed and 15 injured, five fatally, in the burning of the Hotel Helene at Chicago.

More "Boxer" outrages, including the massacre of native Christians, were reported north of Tientsin, China.

The Italian parliament was prorogued by royal decree as a result of the disturbances in the chamber of deputies.

It was announced in London that the Land Steamship company had taken over the West India Steamship company.

Postmaster Thompson of Havana made a sworn statement admitting certain irregularities in connection with the postal funds.

Mr. W. R. Corwin returned from a tour of investigation of Porto Rico for the Merchants' association and reported conditions improving rapidly.
