COL. McCORMICK DEAD.

Colonel Henry McCormick, one of the oldest and most prominent citizens of Harrisburg, died at his country home, in Rosegarten at 1:30 o'clock Saturday morning.

At the opening of the rebellion he offered his life and services to the cause of patriotism, gathering a company of volunteers, company F, Locheil Grays of the 25th regiment, Pennsylvania volunteers, in the three months' service.

Under the act relative to a new geological survey of Pennsylvania, he was appointed by Governor Hartranft a commissioner, and by his colleagues its treasurer, filling these positions until the work was done.

The New Professor of Pedagogy at the Bloomsburg Normal School.

Prof. William Noetting, who, for some twenty years, has been instructor in the science and art of teaching, at the Normal School, was not a candidate for re-election this year.

Dr. Crosswell is a native of the State of Maine, a graduate of Bowdoin College, and a teacher of successful experience.

Principal of Wilson Academy (preparatory collegiate), 1891-'94. Student in Pedagogy, Columbia University, under Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, 1894-'95.

Teacher in public schools of Chicago, and student in Pedagogy under Col. Parker, 1897, March, 1899.

Teacher in Wisconsin Normal School, March, 1899, June, 1899.

During the present summer he is employed by the Superintendent of Public Instruction in the State of Maine to instruct at the Teacher's Institute of the State.

Dr. Crosswell is a contributor to some of the leading educational papers, two of his articles at least—"Courses of Study in Elementary Schools" and "Amusements of School Children" have attracted the attention of leading educators.

Prof. Hyde of Bowdoin writes of Dr. Crosswell, "Mr. Crosswell is by far the best qualified and equipped man we have met in these lines that we have graduated in the past twenty years, and I am confident, if elected, he will give entire satisfaction."

Dr. G. Stanley Hall, Pres. of Clark University, under whom Dr. Crosswell received the latter part of his training in Pedagogy, writes, "He is well trained, sensible, ambitious, has had successful experience in educational positions, is very discreet, wise, enthusiastic, strong and of pleasant personality. Just the man for you. I am glad to give him my hearty commendation."

Prof. E. G. Lancaster, Professor of Philosophy and Pedagogy, Colorado College, writes, "I have known Dr. T. R. Crosswell for several years and am intimately acquainted with him and his work. He has had a very unusual training for University work in Pedagogy."

State Supt. Stetson, of Maine, in whose employ he is during the present summer writes, "Mr. T. R. Crosswell, of Chicago, is peculiarly fitted by nature, training, and experience to do acceptable service in the Department of Theory and Art of Teaching."

The management of the Bloomsburg Normal School seems to have found an unusually strong man for this position, and we predict for the Department of Pedagogy marked progress under his direction.

CRAB FROM INDIAN OCEAN.

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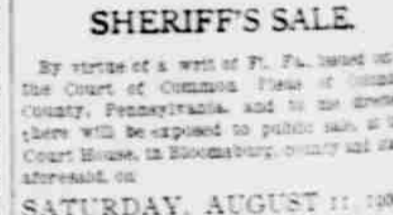
