

No artist of our day has made a more profound impression on the world than James Tissot (pronounced years in London, where he accumulated a fortune, which made him affluent, and his grand establishment was almost constantly the scene of real frivolities, such as his pictures represented. The death of a very dear friend turned his thoughts in another direction, and he gave himself up to religious meditation and prayer. With this change in his life came a new inspiration, to paint a series of pictures that would truthfully illustrate the life of Christ. All portrayals of Bible scenes, whether by the old masters or more modern artists, had been merely fanciful. As Tissot him- they could not be finished in self says, "All the schools of art have worked, more or less conscientiously, to lead astray public opinion in these matters." To accomplish his design ted and suited. Accordingly, he went to Palestine, and spent ten years in studying its topography, sacred localities, types of lining. people, and manners and customs, and during that time read the Gospels "over and over again a hundred times." Then he painted about five hundred pictures, small in size, but such truthful representations of oriental scenes and gospel incidents, that they were at once accepted as the most realistic illustrations of the life of Christ that have ever been produced, and will, no doubt, become the standard for the new century. They were exhibited in Paris, London, New York and other cities, and tens of thousands flocked to see them, even at a high rate of admission. 





The male choir will lead the singing and render several separate selections.


